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On the 18th day of March, A.D. 1996, between the hours of 6:10 o'clock p.m. and 8:20 o'clock p.m., the above entitled meeting came on for discussion before said JUAN SOLIS, SR., and the following proceedings were had:

MR. BAILEY: Could I have your attention, please? If we could, call the order for the March 18th Restoration Advisory Board.

Welcome to the RAB members, welcome to guests that have come to hear the presentations regarding the efforts by Kelly Air Force Base to clean up contamination both on and off Kelly Air Force Base.

This evening, we will be having two special presentations. One will be made by the Commander of the San Antonio Air Logistics Center, Major General James Childress. Also, later, after we have a break, we will have a presentation by a gentleman representing the Defense Environmental Response Task Force. At this time, after the welcome, I would like, if at all possible, for the RAB members to introduce yourselves and give an association as to who you're representing. This is more so for

1	the community and also for the people from the
2	Defense Environmental Response Task Force. If
3	we could Start with Doctor Lene on the far
4	left, if we could, please.
5	MR. LENE: I'm Gene Lene. I'm a
6	professor at St. Mary's University.
7	MR. RODRIGUEZ: My name is
8	Nick Rodriguez and I'm with the Bexar
9	Metropolitan Water District San Antonio.
10	MR. SANCHEZ: My name is
11	Sam Sanchez and I'm with the San Antonio
12	Metropolitan Health District.
13	MR. QUINTANILLA: My name is
14	Armando Quintanilla. I live in the South
15	San Antonio area. I'm with South San Antonio
16	P.R.O.U.D., the Community for Environmental
17	Justice. I live in the contaminated area.

20	Union Pacific Railroad.
21	MR. ROBERSON: I'm Paul Roberson

14		name is Larry Bailey. I'm the director of
15		environmental programs at Kelly Air Force Base.
16		Welcome.
17		MR. WEINSTEIN: I'm
18	·	Ed Weinstein. I'm representing San Antonio
19		Water Systems.
20		MR. CULBERTSON: Tom Culbertson,
21		Regional Clean Air & Water Association.

24		MR. BAILEY: Thank you very
25		much. At this time, I'd like to begin with the

administrative topics on our overall agenda. Ιf 1 we could, go to the February 6th, 1996, meeting 2 minutes and if we have any input from RAB 3 membership for corrections. If we do not have 4 any recommendations for corrections or 5 suggestions for changes, could I have a motion 6 to approve the February 6th, 1996, meeting 7 minutes? 8 9 MR. ROBERSON: Motion to approve. MR. BAILEY: We have a motion. 10 MR. SMITH: Second. 11 MR. BAILEY: And a second. All 12 13 those in favor, please show a sign with their 14 hand, please. 15 (Vote by the RAB members.) 16 MR. BAILEY: Those against? 17 (Vote by the RAB members.) MR. BAILEY: Okay. We have a 18 19 motion. It has been approved to approve the 20 February 6th, 1996, meeting minutes. 21 Membership issues? MR. SOLIS: Yes. We have a bill 22 saying that a member of this board has tendered 23 his resignation because of a potential conflict 2.4 25 of interest. We plan to accept his

1 resignation. There's also -- Mr. Gill has 2 missed two consecutive meetings and he is 3 supposed to write us a letter regarding his 4 desires. 5 MR. BAILEY: We also will contact Mr. Gill and we will send a letter to him to 6 7 find out if, in fact, he wishes to continue 8 membership on the RAB Board. Mr. Gill is a 9 local neighborhood resident and we will try to 10 have him continue to come to the board 11 meetings. 12 Next issue is, we had read previously, two 13 RAB meetings ago, a conflict of interest 14 statement -- last week we read it -- and the 15 purpose was for RAB members who may have a 16 potential conflict of interest to please 17 indicate just by a sign -- and with that, we 18 will go on. 19 MR. QUINTANILLA: (Motion by 20 Mr. Quintanilla.) 21 MR. BAILEY: Thank you. 22 also, was a request made earlier regarding any reportable spills that Kelly Air Force Base 23 24 might have to regulatory agencies and there have

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been no reportable spills since February 6th and

the March 18th RAB meeting. And just as a general item for the people from the communities, when there is a spill on Kelly Air Force Base, we do report that to the regulators, even though it is not required.

If I could go now -- and I would like to introduce the Commander of the San Antonio Air Logistics Center, Major General James Childress.

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Thank you, Larry. Mr. Solis, I appreciate the opportunity to address the Restoration Advisory Board tonight. What I would like to do is spend just a few minutes talking to you and the community about our requirements -- what we are required to do, but in addition that, what we're committed to do and what our intentions are regarding the environmental issues at Kelly.

First of all -- and I'll be very brief about this, because this is all very detailed and very technical -- but we are required by the law, as we realign Kelly and we privatize the workload, to make a very detailed environmental assessment of the status of our facility and our -- our groundwater and our soils on Kelly and to put into place remediation efforts -- or

remediation remedies -- to bring those -- the environmental considerations into compliance as dictated by the Environmental Protection Agency and Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission.

In other words, what we are required to do by law before we convey any property to private individuals or to the City is to make sure that those remediation efforts bring the environment into compliance and we're committed to do that and we're required to do it and, in fact, we are -- programmed the money to do that in our distant programs.

We have -- I guess the message I'd want to leave with everybody here -- and I'm sure you're -- most of you are aware of this -- is that our environmental program at Kelly is nothing new. We've been working on this problem since 1983, at the very start. We have a very good understanding of our situation at Kelly with regard to the environment, both with groundwater and soil. We know what contamination exists. We are better defining that as we go through the closure process, but we have a very good understanding of our current

situation.

We have spent, over the past 12 years, some hundred million dollars in defining the problem and in putting into place restoration projects which treat soil and treat groundwater, again, to the -- to the levels dictated by the regulators, both EPA and the Texas regulators. There is much yet to do. We have -- We have identified, in our programming documents, some 160 million dollars required to continue the cleanup efforts and complete the remediation of the projects at Kelly. Those dollars are in our program. They are very well recognized.

I will tell you that environmental money, in the Air Force, is among the easiest to obtain. I cannot think of an instance in which we did not receive or have not received the environmental dollars to do the things we have to do to clean up our environmental problems.

So -- There is a legal requirement -- and I'm sure that the lawyers among you can attest to this -- and a very detailed legal process by which we must go through, identify the issues, begin the remediation process, monitor the remediation process and make sure that that

remediation is actually working before we can convey any property, before we can turn over any property to either private individuals or the City. And, so, we legally have to go do that and that's what we're off -- beginning the process of doing right now.

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We are committed to do it and we are obligated to do it and we intend to do it as quickly as we can. And, again, that commitment you can witness through our programming of dollars in the Air Force to put these systems into place, to -- starting with the environmental assessment and going all the way through the remediation projects.

Kelly has been a neighbor here for many years. It's been a good neighbor for many years. We're not going to stop being a good neighbor. So, I wouldn't want you to think that we're only doing this because we're legally required to do it. In fact, we're going to do it as a part of the community.

Our vision for Kelly is the same as the City's vision for Kelly and that is that it would continue being a state-of-the-art, world-class industrial facility for many years

to come and in order to do that, we have to -as if the Air Force were going to be here
forever, we have to clean up the mistakes of the
past, which we are -- embarked on doing -- and
prepare the grounds and the facilities there for
continued operation. The only difference being,
in this case, it be operation under private
contractors. So, the problem is no different.
The resources that are going to apply -- be
applied to this problem are no different and the
outcome is going to be no different, as if the
Air Force were going to be there forever. And
that is the Air Force's commitment to this.

I can guarantee you that that's our intention and I don't believe that you can find any evidence to the contrary in terms of public statements, in terms of budget process or in terms of any other public pronouncements that anybody in the Air Force has ever made. So, I don't think that there should be any mystery in what the Air Force is all about here. We really believe -- and, obviously -- I think this has been conveyed to you many times -- we believe that we are a part of the community and we're going to work as part of the community to clean

up the mistakes of the past and to put these remediation and restoration projects in place.

The other commitment that I would make to you is that we're going to be open in this process. We have an open meeting here tonight. We're going to make our records available to you. As Larry just mentioned, there's nothing secret there. If we have spills or if we have things that go on, those records are open. There are no secrets. We are -- We're going to share with the community the information that we are able to share with the community in terms of our intentions, our plans and the things that are going on at Kelly day to day.

So, that's our commitment to you. I'd be glad to open the floor up to questions from the -- from the RAB members, but I wanted to just give you an overview, from my standpoint, having just arrived, of the situation at Kelly, as I see it today. So, you know our commitment, you know our -- our -- our legal requirements. I think they're compatible and I believe they are in the best interest of the community.

So, with that, Mr. Solis, I would open the floor to questions.

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Certainly.

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Now, you

1 MR. SOLIS: Thank you, sir. 2 MR. QUINTANILLA: General, I have 3 In our original letter to you that a question. 4 we sent to you in December -- in our -- in our -- to meet with you on that particular 5 day -- sometime in December -- we wanted to 6 7 meet with you to let you know that 30 years was 8 too long to live with contamination in our 9 neighborhood and that -- perhaps, that you could 10 do something to scrap the plan or come up with a 11 survival plan for our neighborhood, because our 12 property values are consistently going down and 13 30 years is too long. 14 I am sure that you as a leader would not 15 let your airmen live in an area that would be 16 contaminated for 30 years. We do not want to 17 live in an area that's -- that will be 18 contaminated for 30 years, because of the 19 decreasing of our property values. We cannot 20 sell our homes as long as it's contaminated for 21 the value that we have placed upon them. 22 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Okay. 23 I respond? 24 MR. QUINTANILLA:

have a couple of issues there that I'd like to try to respond to. First of all, the 30-year cleanup period that we're talking about -- much of -- first -- what I would say is that -- that these -- that the contamination we're talking about does not represent a threat to health or wellness or fitness, to the best of our knowledge. We've had many, many surveys that have identified the -- the contamination that we're talking about and they -- does not -- it doesn't affect drinking water and -- and all of those things. So, to the best of our knowledge, the contamination we're talking about does not represent a threat to peoples' health.

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The 30-year time period that we're talking about, much -- much of that has to do with the treatment of the contamination but much of it has to do with the monitoring -- and that monitoring goes on for many, many years, as you understand -- as you-all well know. The length of time involved in the cleanup has to do with the geology, has to do with the nature of the contamination, has to do with the way the water moves and all those other things. So, we believe -- and I am convinced -- that what

we've got in place is a program and a process to clean this up on the best available schedule given the money that's available to us and with the assurance that what is in place there -- what is there today -- doesn't pose a threat to peoples' health.

Now, the other -- the other point you made was about property values. We know of no definitive studies or opinions that say that peoples' property values have been devalued because of the contamination. I'm sure that is your opinion. I don't know that we've got any evidence to that effect and I guess that's where we have to leave that one.

MR. QUINTANILLA: One more point, General: On the 30-year plan, now, that you said that -- you know, that -- that -- that's about as long as it's going to take. We believe that we have a hydrologist that would like to present a plan that will do it in less time and at less cost. We would like to make that presentation to you at a later date.

MR. QUINTANILLA: Thank you very

1 much. 2 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: If there 3 aren't any questions, I guess we can open it up for the audience. 4 5 MR. SOLIS: Yes, sir. 6 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Okay. Yes, 7 ma'am. MS. LIMON: On the information 8 9 that -- that you have on this contaminated area, 10 would you buy in that area. 11 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Would I buy? 12 13 MS. LIMON: Yes. 14 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Ma'am, I've 15 got a house in Washington I can't sell. 16 MS. LIMON: Would you buy in this 17 I'm asking you: Would you buy in this area? 18 area? Considering the situation as it is now, 19 would you buy in this area? 2.0 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I can tell 21 you that from what I understand of the environmental situation there, that would not be 22 23 a reason I wouldn't buy. I'm assured by 24 experts -- and you can -- you know that we have 25 our experts here, we -- you know that we had

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1 independent looks made of this and a study made of this situation. It does not pose a health 2 3 hazard to the people living there. So, I can 4 tell you that that would not cause me not to buy 5 a house. 6 MS. LIMON: I have another 7 question, also. What part does seven panel 8 people play in this environmental -- the people 9 that are coming to bring jobs, from what I 10 understand, to Kelly? 11 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: 12 Kelly Board of Directors? 13 MS. LIMON: Yes. 14 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: 15 Kelly Development Corporation? Mr. Roberson is 16 the Executive Director of the Greater Kelly 17 Development Corporation. The board of directors 18 are the folks who are putting together the reuse 19 plan, the remediation -- or the -- not 20 remediation -- the redevelopment plan for 21 Kelly. The Greater Kelly Development 22 Corporation, in the end, will operate the 23 facility. They will own and operate the 24 industrial complex --

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MS. LIMON: I'm talking about the

people that were appointed by the City Council. 1 2 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Right. 3 Yes, ma'am. Those are the board of directors of 4 the --5 MS. LIMON: What part do they 6 play in that -- in the -- in the 7 contamination -- or keeping it clean with the new companies that are coming in? 8 9 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Okay. What we have to do -- and I'll turn it over to 10 11 Mr. Roberson and he can address part of this --12 what we have to do in order to turn the property 13 over to the development corporation is put those 14 remediation efforts in place that I was talking about to the satisfaction of the EPA and the 15 16 regulators. It then becomes the responsibility 17 of the Greater Kelly Development Corporation to 18 ensure that the private contractors operating at 19 Kelly comply with all of the regulatory 20 requirements that they have and ensure that the 21 property is contaminated no further. 22 MS. LIMON: Are they going to 23 treat it as a business? MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I'll let 24 25 Mr. Roberson talk to that.

think what General Childress said is exactly right. I see our job as twofold. One, to monitor what the Air Force is doing, to ensure that when we receive the land and the facilities that -- that all their legal responsibilities have been met. And, then, beyond that, as companies come into the redevelopment area, that -- that they comply with all the rules and regulations that are now required to ensure that future contamination will not occur.

MS. LIMON: But if that's costing too much money to police these companies, are you going to -- if we're losing too much money trying to figure -- you know, any petty thing that the neighborhood says, "Well, look, this" -- "this puddle or this other puddle" -- Well, I'm going to get down to what I'm saying -- or what I'm coming to -- is that one of the panel there -- Chave Gonzaba treated -- her business -- it was in the article -- as medicine -- when -- she mentioned when medicine wasn't a business. Well, I'm an experiment of her good business, because I'm in a wheelchair. See, she did such a good business that she

didn't put my mentally sick ex-husband in the 1 2 hospital because she was trying to save money, 3 so I'm in a wheelchair now. The people in the South San area -- the Fenfield -- all the --4 5 what is it -- Holder -- all those streets 6 there -- are going to be me. I'm in a 7 wheelchair because she was trying to save money. I'm just worried -- and my family still 8 9 lives there and I don't want them to be victims 10 of her again -- of her Gonzaba -- they have a 11 self-interest there, because the people that 12 work at Kelly are going to go to her clinic. 13 They see a thousand people a day. My ex-husband was one of the thousand that she saw. 14 15 how good a business she makes.

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Is the people in the South San area -- are they going to suffer like what I suffer? She's going to see them as a business. Well, it's too much to be policing. I don't know how she got chosen, but I am one of her -- a victim because of her good business and I'll be for the rest of my life in a wheelchair and I'm just worried about the people in the South San area. I want them to be aware who is in the board.

Now, the rest of the -- what -- seven

members -- six members -- I don't know what it -- her interest is -- like at the end of the article, she says, "Well, if nothing else, I can say I had a part in it." Well, I can tell her, "She has a part of my life that I'm in a wheelchair," and I just want people to know what kind of people are on that panel that the City Council appointed.

MR. ROBERSON: Ma'am, I think that -- that, probably, many people are aware of the fact that as a nation we've become a lot more environmentally aware of what -- what our industry and other activities have done to our environment. And as we become more aware of that, state legislatures and the U.S. Congress have passed a lot of laws and controls, have tasked certain agencies, like the Environmental Protection Agency and the Texas Natural Resources Conservation Commission to manage all that. So, there's lots of people now -- unlike it had been years ago -- lots of people now watching what's going on to pollute our environment -- and we at the Greater Kelly Development Corporation are obligated and committed and want to ensure that companies that

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come into Kelly in the future are going to observe all those regulations that are put into place and we'll watch that very carefully -- and we're going to be watched also by the TNRCC and

by the EPA.

I think that -- that what's happened in our country has been good for the environment and the laws that have been put into place are going to help us do a much better job than perhaps what had been done in the past before we are so aware of what the -- of what was happening to our environment. So, I can tell you that we in the Greater Kelly Development Corporation are committed to ensure that the laws of the land and the laws of this State, regarding the environment, will be met and that those companies will comply with them.

MS. LIMON: Well, I am more committed to -- when you're a doctor, I -- I assume that they go under oath that they're going to help that person. Well, she didn't help him because she was saving money -- sent him home and then -- what -- I'm in a wheelchair. He had been -- had a record of being in the mental hospital, but you see they

saved money and I'm just worried that this is going to happen to the people there in the South San area.

I always thought that I was safe because I lived near Kelly. I didn't know I was sitting on a contaminated area. Well, the Air Force --we're -- you live by the base, you think, "Well, this is a secure place." Was it a secure place? No. And this is the government. So, I don't trust the Gonzaba or anyone on the panel and I can tell them to their face. Thank you.

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Sir?

MR. SEGOVIA: General Childress, my name is Pascual Segovia and I'm a member of the C.O.P.S. organization of St. Joseph's church here at South San. I've been in this area for 35 years and I have served in the C.O.P.S. organization for 16 years, especially in this particular area of St. Joseph's. Father Eugene is our neighbor to -- to you up here at Kelly Air Force Base -- just by Quintana up to Military to Commercial, Southcross up to the -- East Kelly -- all that particular area. That includes the Quintana project and all of this

oil under our community. I'm sure you are familiar with that -- on that Quintana project.

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Well, we have been working with General Curtis and General Smith. Before -- We have met with them several times and we have -just for your information -- we had outstanding cooperation from your staff in giving us the information -- and not only that, but coming up with the funds to provide the money for the Quintana project -- and their outstanding staff on -- I've been -- I call it bother, because I'm -- sometimes I bother them almost on a weekly basis for the past five years -- but I'm just going to let you know that even though we have a commitment between the -- Kelly Air Force Base and the City, I'm concerned and the people are still concerned is the money -- even though it's committed -- if there's -- there's a commitment on paper -- in writing -- is the money going to be there for this to be completed even though I know that -- I know the City is not here -- Mr. Vega -- I know that the -engineering -- the plans are being done right now and it was delayed because of the -- the City wants sewers at the same time. Otherwise,

they would start this probably in December.

So, my -- our question from our community is: Are we -- Will you commit to make sure that even though it's going to be started, maybe, on -- by the middle of this year or -- or the end of the year -- to have the money and to provide it just as soon as possible -- as soon as the City gets all the information -- all the -- through the City Council -- and make sure the money is there so we can start the construction immediately?

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Sir, I have to tell you that if you're talking about Air Force money to begin a remediation project, which is programmed for this year -- and I have to ask if that's what we're talking about it --

MR. BAILEY: Yes, sir, it is.

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Then the money will be there. And, beyond that, as I mentioned before and what I tried to say -- and probably didn't say very well -- is that before we can turn over the property to the City for this redevelopment, we are legally required to put those projects in place and prove that the remediation efforts are effective -- before we

can turn the property over to the development 1 2 corporation -- and, so, the development 3 corporation has a very -- a very high level of 4 interest in making sure that those things 5 happen. The City has the same high level of interest. And if this is Air Force money that 6 7 you're talking about that's required to put the 8 project in place, I can assure you that it will 9 be there. 10 MR. SEGOVIA: Okay. 11 MR. BAILEY: If I could make just 12 one statement --MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: 13 14 MR. BAILEY: The project totals over \$5 million. 15 16 MR. SEGOVIA: That's right. 17 MR. BAILEY: And Kelly Air Force 18 Base has already sat down with the City and 19 we're committed to provide to them -- it's in 20 excess of \$2.5 million for the construction and 21 the design -- that money is here -- and the 22 money is also here should they come across 23 contaminated soil and/or groundwater. There is in excess of \$2.5 million for that project, 24

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So, that over \$5 million is here ready

for the City to call upon it and it's ready to be spent.

MR. SEGOVIA: Right. I have a copy that they've made me. The -- Of course, this problem -- by finishing the construction and the project, which is a large one -- for the people that don't understand which one -- which I'm talking about -- it's -- it's McLaughlin -- McLaughlin from Quintana to Bynum, from Bynum to Quintana and Gerald. That triangle is going to be fixed up with -- with City money -- bond -- and money from Kelly Air Force Base and the -- I understand that -- consider the money is provided, it will start from -- at McLaughlin from Quintanilla -- from there.

Now, that is only -- our only problem right now -- where the money is available. But we are concerned -- We have other streets beyond that area. In other words, we still have from -- let's say Quintana to -- from Military Drive to New Laredo Highway, all the way down to Zarzamora. Those areas still have oil underground. I understand that Kelly Air Force Base has wells around East Kelly; is that correct?

1 MR. BAILEY: Yes, sir. 2 MR. SEGOVIA: -- as being done. It's in addition to the ones that we have in our 3 4 Quintana area that are working and been working 5 for five years to get the oil out and with the 6 new -- new Quintana drainage, it's going to 7 contain the oil, I understand it; is that 8 correct? 9 MR. BAILEY: In the Quintana Road 10 area? 11 MR. SEGOVIA: In the Quintana 12 area. 13 MR. BAILEY: Yes, sir. 14 MR. SEGOVIA: Okay. Anybody 15 living within -- within this area -- within that 16 area that I just mentioned, that is what's going 17 on in the community. Now, what we're trying to 18 do is not only just forget about that area and 19 then -- forget about it -- we have the other --20 what -- about -- between -- between 21 Military Drive and New Laredo Highway -- we had 22 some -- we have some -- from Quintana -- but 23 that's going to start -- what -- you know, 24 construction is going to end at Kelly Air Force 25 Base -- at Gerald -- it still continues all

the way from Gerald to a school -- there are two schools involved -- and those, we have -- we need at least \$2 million -- and we don't know whether there's some oil under there. that's what -- that's why we're concerned that we still need to make sure that -- that the wells continue, the money continues, so that that we can be able to -- to clear all this particular area here in the Quintana area up to New Laredo Highway, so that we can be able to fix all the streets. Because as soon as -- I see that -- that -- that your project is completed, then the next phase is to get the rest of it up to New Laredo Highway and to the schools. The schools -- they really have a problem. Every time it rains, it goes about this much -- all the way -- where the kids can't play. So, the Quintana -- it has to continue from Gerald all the way to -- all the way down to Creighton in order to prevent -- in order to alleviate these two schools.

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So, what -- what I'm saying is that the problem is not finished yet. We have to continue with this environmental program.

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Okay, sir.

I hear you. I believe -- and I will defer to 1 2 Mr. Bailey on this -- that the extent of the contamination is fairly well-known and -- and my 3 4 sense of this is that we have program money to 5 better define the problem and put remediation 6 efforts in place and I -- if the answer is 7 different than that, beyond the Quintana Road 8 project, I would invite Mr. Bailey to add what 9 he wants to add. 10 MR. SEGOVIA: I'm just concerned, 11 because after -- after we finish this program --12 if we continue to do the rest of -- and you know 13 that we have to find out where there's oil, now 14 that we've found some in our area -- money has to be available in order to continue the rest of 15 16 the project. 17 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: 18 understand that. 19 MR. SEGOVIA: See, this project 20 in the Quintana area -- it is a \$25 million 21 project -- and this \$5 million that -- that we 22 have is -- is only a little bit. 23 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Okay, sir. I understand. 24 25 MR. SEGOVIA: So, all I'm saying

is that we need to make sure that the -- this program that you have will continue up to the other areas to assure that the oil that is from there to be taken out. Otherwise, after that, you're gone and then -- then, after, we open the street and there's some oil there.

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Okay.

Again, I would just repeat one thing. We are not only -- Even if we weren't legally committed to doing just what you say, to find out exactly where the contamination is and clean it up, we would -- we would feel compelled to do that because we're neighbors. But we are, in fact, legally required, before we can turn over any property to the City or to the TKGC to do exactly what you're saying -- and that is to find out where contamination is and put projects in place to clean it up. So, we've got to do that.

MR. SEGOVIA: Right. Because before the -- the -- is -- Kelly Air Force is privatized, we have to ensure that the -- the contamination is contained completely before this is really gone.

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: We agree.

Because after it's MR. SEGOVIA: 1 2 gone, it's just going to leave oil under our --MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: 3 can't leave -- Well, we can't leave the oil 4 under there and we don't intend to. That's the 5 point. 6 Do you promise that 7 MR. SEGOVIA: you'll continue with the program --8 9 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: We have to do that. 10 11 MR. SEGOVIA: Okay. Thank you 12 very much. MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: All right. 13 14 MR. QUINTANILLA: General 15 Childress, I have one more question. In the 16 press last week when the environmental -- the 17 private industry came into Kelly and -- there 18 was a press release to those people from the 19 environmental office that the contamination only 20 extended a few hundred feet off-base. 21 Approximately, what is the amount of acreage? 22 understand it's several hundred if you take 23 South Kelly, East Kelly and North Kelly. Of the 24 contamination that's off-base, how many acres? 25 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I'll have

to defer to somebody to answer that opinion. 1 MR. QUINTANILLA: It's more than 2 3 a few hundred feet, I'm sure. MR. BAILEY: Yes. 4 information that we told the environmental 5 industry people was -- and we opened up our 6 7 records to them -- because there were some industry groups like General Electric and Boeing 8 9 and others who happen to come to the base who 10 are very interested in possibly coming in and setting up shop. We actually showed some of the 11 12 charts, which they wanted to see. It's the same charts that we show here at the RAB. It shows 13 out into the community where this goes. 14 while the statement may have said, "A couple 15 hundred feet, " they were able to see that there 16 17 was more than a couple of hundred feet. 18 MR. QUINTANILLA: Who gave them 19 that statement that it was only a hundred feet. MR. BAILEY: I can't answer 20 2.1 I don't know. It was probably -that. 22 MR. QUINTANILLA: I saw a hand up 23 over there. 24 MR. WALTERS: I was dealing with 25 the man who wrote that article,

Mr. Jerry Needham, with the San Antonio Express 1 News. Mr. Quintanilla, he did not receive that 2 in a press release from Kelly. He found it 3 somewhere in some background material he had in 4 his office and he added it -- and you will note 5 6 that his name was at the top of the article. Ιt 7 was not a press release from Kelly. based upon an interview he did, plus his 8 9 background files that he had. 10 MR. QUINTANILLA: Very good. 11 Now, what is being done to correct this 12 misconception -- this perception it's only a few hundred feet off-base? 13 MR. WALTERS: Mr. Quintanilla, if 14 15 I had to go out and correct every misstatement 16 that was in the press in San Antonio regarding 17 this, it would be impossible. I continue to try 18 to give them the facts, just as we have tried 19 with this board here. That's all I can do, sir. 20 MR. OUINTANILLA: But it is more 21 than a few hundred feet off base; is that 22 correct? 23 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I believe 24 that you've seen the maps and --25 MR. QUINTANILLA: Yes. But I --

1	I do not know how many acres, sir. I've heard
2	it's several hundred.
3	MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I don't
4	know.
5	MR. BAILEY: I don't know how
6	many total acres it is
7	MR. QUINTANILLA: We haven't made
8	a study of this, then, apparently?
9	MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Oh, yes, we
10	have.
11	MR. QUINTANILLA: So, then, we
12	should know how many acres.
13	MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Can we get
14	the number of acres?
15	MR. BAILEY: Yes.
16	MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: We can get
17	you the number of acres.
18	MR. QUINTANILLA: I would like to
19	have them before the next meeting.
20	MR. SMITH: General Childress, I
21	have a question. The 30-year program
22	Obviously, you're not going to be here for
23	another 30 years the Air Force itself is
24	not. The development corporation is going to
25	take over the oversight of the continuing

development and protect against further 1 contamination by the new tenants. One is 2 surely -- just to make an analogy -- I buy a 3 4 washing machine from a local store and it goes 5 bankrupt, I don't want to have to call the 6 factory to get service done. Once you're 7 gone -- We have a mechanism in you and your office here to oversee and make sure the money 8 9 is coming in and everything else. Once your 10 office isn't physically here, what mechanism is 11 going to continue this 30-year program other 12 than DOD in Washington? 13 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Well, that is the answer. I mean, we retain the 14 15 responsibility for however long it takes to

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Well, that is the answer. I mean, we retain the responsibility for however long it takes to complete the cleanup and the U.S. Air Force -- I guarantee you even though Kelly Air Force

Base -- the flag may come down at our place -- but the U.S. Air Force is legally committed to complete that work. So --

MR. SMITH: So, there won't be, necessarily, a local mechanism setup here -- left behind to follow this -- like the environmental management department you have now?

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1 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I can't 2 tell what's going to be in place beyond 2001 to 3 do that. But I quarantee you that there will be people with telephones in the Air Force --4 5 MR. SMITH: My question is 6 whether there's going to be a local mechanism 7 here. Otherwise, we'll have to deal -- or deal 8 with DOD --9 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I don't 10 I can't tell you right now. know. MR. SMITH: Mr. Bailey, do you 11 12 have an answer? 13 MR. BAILEY: I can speak to 14 The current plans -- The overall question 15 was: After Kelly isn't here -- us -- after 2001 -- July of 2001 -- will there be a local 16 17 mechanism for people from the community to go to, to talk -- to find out about what's 18 19 happening regarding cleanup? The answer is 20 There is an Air Force Base conversion yes. 21 agency which was set up to take a look at 22 exactly what's being done now. So, they will 23 carry the baton in the years that were just talked about by General Childress. 24 25 So, even though it may not be some of the

staff that you currently see here, there will be other people coming in and working with whatever cleanup program has been developed, as well as working with the regulators. So, it's not a stopped issue. It continues on and there will be some type of local affiliation that will be present.

MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Yes,

ma'am?

Mrs. Kneupper. I live at 7402 Quintana Road and I'm here because I'm interested in my area. I'm interested in my friends and -- and the people that live around me. I -- I am interested in the plans of the City, according to -- to buildings -- homes -- you know, restrictions on building a home. Now, there's a lot of elderly people where I live. There's -- There's people that have worked hard to build their homes, to keep their homes, you know -- you know, in the right condition -- and, according to the City, if one of our homes -- if our home burns up, we cannot rebuild. That is the law.

Now, I don't think it is fair for this

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elderly people, like myself, to have worked all their lives to build their homes and -- and, heaven forbid, if their home was to burn, they cannot rebuild. So, they would have to go somewhere where they can live, but it will not be on their -- on their land, because they cannot build a home. And I would like to know if the City -- now that Kelly will be no more --I hope -- you know, plans to -- to change this -- this rule -- plans to change this rule -- and, also, about the water -- about five months ago, there was -- well, it was about five or six months ago -- there was a fireman -- you know, they were right across the road from my house and I was wondering, you know, where the -- where the fire was. So, I talked to one of the firemen and he told me that they had found a leak right along the Southern Pacific tracks. Now, they claim that they have fixed it, but I have noticed a very funny flavor on my water. So -- you know, I would like to -- you know, to bring this to your attention, please. But, most of all -- But, most of all, I would ask you gentlemen who -- who are heads of all these programs to please see if you can change

this -- you know, these restrictions that we 1 have, because you will -- you will not only help 2 yourself spiritually, but you will help the 3 people that are not able to build a home in case 4 their home burns. So, please, I ask you in the 5 6 name of the Lord, "Help us." Thank you very 7 much. MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Ma'am, I 8 9 can honestly say that I don't have anything to 10 do with where you can build a house. So -- I don't know if there's a City representative here 11 12 that would like to address that --13 MR. HAGELTHORN: Mr. Beyer wants 14 to clarify something. 15 MR. BEYER: This has nothing to 16 do with the home issue. I'm sorry. 17 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Well, 18 first, do we have anybody that can address 19 the --20 MR. SANCHEZ: Mrs. Kneupper, my 21 name is Sam Sanchez and I'm -- I'm not a 22 building inspector. I'm with the Health 23 Department for the City of San Antonio and 24 whatever building restrictions or information 25 that -- or whomever communicated it to you --

the -- the proper source for building 1 2 restrictions -- they come from a variety of --3 of -- of direction. One of them could be a deed 4 restriction itself on the property. MS. KNEUPPER: No -- No, sir. 5 6 MR. SANCHEZ: No, no. That's 7 8 yours, but somebody else's. Number two, it 9

just one of them that could -- not necessarily yours, but somebody else's. Number two, it could be the -- that over the years -- you've been annexed into the City -- you've been in the City for more than 20 years -- when those properties were annexed, there was a building code that grandfathered many of those building standards so that you could -- you know, everybody could live, you know, accordingly. But -- and this is just a guesstimate -- you know -- you know, whenever a house like that burns -- whatever -- the new building codes take into effect in terms of how far can you be from your house -- you know, that kind of information. Now, that's just a guesstimate.

My suggestion would be that -- that -- -Our director of building inspections is a
gentleman named Gene Camargo.

MS. KNEUPPER: Camargo.

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1 MR. SANCHEZ: Camargo. He would -- He would be able to specifically look 2 3 at your property and determine what building 4 restrictions, if any, exist on that property. MS. KNEUPPER: Well, I know --5 6 MR. SANCHEZ: Because it may very 7 well be true that there are no building 8 restrictions, but -- and the restrictions are 9 not necessarily building. It could be, you know, property size or -- you know, distance 10 11 from the next neighbor. 12 MS. KNEUPPER: Well, the -- the 13 restrictions that we had were because of the 14 airplanes. 15 MR. QUINTANILLA: It's an overlay 16 zone. That's what it is. 17 MS. KNEUPPER: Because of 18 airplanes. So, now that we're not going to 19 have, you know, so many airplanes flying, maybe, 20 you know, we can claim our property, you know, 21 as we once, you know, claimed it. 22 MR. SANCHEZ: Well, I think that 23 that's another entirely different subject in 24 terms of, you know, those overlay zones and 25 where the -- that were -- again, those were

specific deed restrictions on the property. 1 MS. KNEUPPER: 2 But now -- Yes, But now that Kelly is going to be closed, 3 4 won't that, you know, kind of ease our -- our 5 restrictions a little? MR. SANCHEZ: I think that 6 when -- and, again, I'm not a lawyer -- but when 7 that activity of flying over, you know, ceases, 8 if it -- if it ever does, then you may be able 9 to seek adjustments to the board of -- or 10 11 adjustment in terms of correcting those deed restrictions. 12 MS. KNEUPPER: Who can I talk to 13 about that? 14 15 MR. SANCHEZ: Mr. Gene Camargo. 16 MR. ROBERSON: Ma'am, if I 17 could -- if I could get your phone number afterwards, I'll have Mr. Camargo give you a 18 19 call. 20 MS. KNEUPPER: Thank you very 21 much. 22 MR. ROBERSON: And with regard to the flying activity, however, the primary flying 23 activity is the C-5 Reserve Wing and the F-16 24 25 Guard Wing. They are both remaining as they

are. They're going to be realigned to Lackland Air Force Base. So, that activity -- that flying activity is going to continue at about the same level it is now.

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MR. RODRIGUEZ: Mrs. Kneupper, I'd like to address the issue that -- that you have with the -- with the taste of water. We've got -- In conversations, there's always -- in the same breath, you know, that we mention that there's a waterline that -- that travels with -with -- with the -- the hydrology of the land there, but we've got to make sure and that we understand that the water source -- the drinking water -- does not come from -- from the vicinity of where the water is contaminated. It's entirely two different sources of water. There's a very shallow water aquifer. That's the one being contaminated. Where you get the water from -- it's -- it's about a thousand foot deep. It has nothing in correlation with the -- with the contamination that are associated with each other. You may --If you feel that there is a taste in the water, we'd be more than glad to go over there and take a sample. But I'll -- I'll assure you there's

nothing wrong with the water, because there's two different -- entirely two different sources.

MS. KNEUPPER: Okay. Thank you very much.

MR. BEYER: I'm Gary Beyer with the Texas Natural Resource Conservation Commission. I'm going to address the question earlier about where you can go to find out -you know, agreements between the Air Force and the State of Texas. The State of Texas, through the TNRCC, will issue what is known as a post-closure care permit -- and this is an agreement signed by both the Air Force and the TNRCC to agree to all the remedial actions that are going to be put into place out at Kelly. So, you will be able to contact people at the TNRCC. Our documents are open and we're willing to discuss with you any remedial actions that you have any questions about.

MR. QUINTANILLA: General, I have a question for Mr. Beyer. Mr. Beyer, how is your office funded? Is it funded by the Department of Defense through Air Force or how -- how does that work?

MR. BEYER: The TNRCC gets

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1 funding from a variety of sources. We do get 2 some money from the Department of Defense through a state memorandum of agreement. And, 3 so, we have -- do get some funding from the DOD, 4 5 also. 6 MR. QUINTANILLA: Thank you very 7 much. 8 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Any further 9 questions? 10 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: What I 11 would like to know -- My name is (inaudible). Ι 12 live, I would say, less than 150 yards from the 13 gas tanks -- gasoline tanks -- what I want to 14 know is -- like last Sunday, about 1:30, there 15 was a smell. I have asthma. With that smell, I 16 get headaches. I'm starting to get seizures. 17 What is that smell? 18 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I can't 19 answer your question, ma'am. 2.0 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: They come 21 on the weekend, they come on the weekday and 22 work 2:00 o'clock in the morning and 2:00 in the 23 afternoon. What is that smell? Nobody has ever 24 given me an answer. 25 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: And I

understand that -- that people have identified that. I don't think that we have an answer to that. Have we --

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Like my doctor said, "If you can find out what it is, maybe I can give you something that will" -- My seizures are getting worse and it starts with that smell.

MR. BAILEY: We have gone out to the area when those tanks are being refueled by trucks and we've taken samples and such. We've done that over a number of years so that we could go back and check and see what we would consider to be under worst case conditions with employees actually being there when the fuel was being dispensed -- what the situation happened The type -- Since -- While we've been doing that, we also have now switched over to a different type of fuel that are stored in those tanks. Fuel that is less flammable, let us say, than what used to be stored there previously. The vapors from those fuels -- now with the current fuel -- are far less than even what was there previously.

All I can tell you is what we've done.

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1 We'd be glad to share that with you. What I'd like to open up also is -- we do have a number 2 3 that you can phone. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: It doesn't 4 5 do any good. MR. BAILEY: It doesn't do any 6 7 good? 8 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: No. If I 9 knew what hours they do it, I'd stay away 10 because my condition is getting worse. 11 MR. BAILEY: But I'm talking 12 about when you actually smell something to phone 13 this number and then have the people go out 14 there at that time. Because we've been out 15 there and we've had people out there even when 16 they have not been dispensing fuel and it just 17 may be that we have people out there and they 18 just can't smell --19 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Му 20 daughter was there and -- and she said, "Mom, 21 who's painting? Is Kelly doing work on 22 Sunday?" It was on a Sunday afternoon and --23 and that smell -- and then that headache and then -- that's it for me. 24 25 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Have you

called at the time that you smelled this --1 2 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Well, me 3 and my neighbors -- we can see that we all have the same problem and --4 5 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: How about if we make sure you have a number and I will 6 7 commit to you that we will get people out to 8 take readings or find out --9 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Because, like my doctor, he needs to know what's causing 10 this. If I can get something that will help 11 me -- I don't want to get worse than what I am. 12 13 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Okay. 14 We'll get you the number and the next time it comes up, please call and we will have somebody 15 there and we'll try to figure what's going on 16 17 out. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 18 19 Thank you. Fine. 20 MS. MEDINA: My name is 21 Patricia Medina. I've heard that over there off 22 of General McMullen they have a clinic where the 23 people that live around there can go to. you heard about that? There's a doctor that 24 25 sees people around there.

1 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Not -- Not 2 There may be. It's not -- He's that I'm aware. 3 not associated with the base, to the best of my knowledge. 4 5 MS. MEDINA: That's what I 6 understood. That's why I thought I'd ask you, 7 you know, being -- you know, because you hear a lot of rumors. But I have heard that. 8 9 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: I'm getting 10 a lot of head shakes up here, so I don't think 11 there's anybody associated with the base. 12 MS. MEDINA: Okay. Because I 13 heard it had to do with something about 14 contamination. 15 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: No. 16 MS. MEDINA: Okay. Thank you. 17 MAJ. GEN. CHILDRESS: Okay. Any 18 other questions for me? 19 Thank you for your attention. Again, 20 Mr. Solis, thank you for the opportunity to 21 Again, I just want to make sure everybody 22 understands that -- that we're in for the 23 long-term here and we're not going to walk away 24 from anything that's not good for the 25 community. Thank you.

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MR. SOLIS:

Thank you,

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General Childress. Let's take a 15-minute break

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and we'll readjourn in 15 minutes.

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(Short break taken.)

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At this time, we would like to introduce Mr. Shah Choudhory.

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He's the gentleman who is representing the

MR. BAILEY:

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Defense Environmental Response Task Force. As

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we indicated in the past, the most senior

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person -- the most senior environmental person

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within the Department of Defense is planning on

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being here in San Antonio May 8th and 9th. And,

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so, we're trying to coordinate the visit with the most senior environmental person and other

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more senior Department of Defense environmental

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officials to come to a Restoration Advisory

Board meeting, as well as -- they plan on

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holding a two-day workshop here in town, which

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is open to the public. But without stealing any

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qusto -- Sir?

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MR. CHOUDHORY: Thank you,

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Mr. Bailey. I think you did steal most of my

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thunder. Mr. Solis, thank you for inviting me

to speak to this meeting of the Restoration

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Advisory Board.

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As with most speakers from the Department of Defense, I had to use some slides. Copies of the slides have been passed out to members of the Restoration Advisory Board. As Mr. Bailey said, my name is Shah Choudhory. I work in the DOD cleanup office. I work for Ms. Sherri Goodman, who is the senior person in DOD dealing with environment. I am also the executive secretary of the Defense Environmental Restoration Task Force, which basically means I get to put on this function, do the administration requirements and make sure that when the task force visits, they can concentrate on the issues at hand.

What I want to do is talk to you a little bit about the task force, who's on it, what it does and what they'll be doing here again in May -- and I also want to express appreciation to the members of the Restoration Advisory Board here for being flexible enough to accommodate our meeting on the 8th and 9th.

The Defense Environmental Restoration Task

Force -- and I'll call it DERTF for short -- was

originally established by Congress in 1991. It

met for about -- three or four times and, as

required by congressional charter, produced a report and was disbanded. Then in 1993, Congress reconstituted it and reformed it and called it back into function. It functions as a federal advisory committee, which means all of its business meetings, like the one in May, are open to the public and public are invited to sit in on the meeting and we do have a public comment period where the task force members are being subject to hearing the opinions of the community on issues dealing with environmental cleanup of closing bases.

One of the main things that Congress charged the task force with doing was to take a look at the cleanup process at closing bases and to make recommendations on improving that process and to go ahead and report the recommendations to Congress. The means that it provides those recommendations to Congress and to the Department of Defense is through the annual report, and the annual report, as I said, takes a look at ways to recommend improvements to supply the cleanup of closing and realigning bases, other recommendations that the members feel are appropriate and how well are federal

and state agencies doing in implementing the recommendations made by the DERTF.

There are nine members of the task force.

The chair is Ms. Goodman, representing the

Department of Defense, and then we have other

federal members representing the Department of

Justice, the General Services Administration,

the Environmental Protection Agency and the

Corps of Engineers.

We also have non-federal members, primarily representing state agencies and public interest groups. The National Governors' Association has nominated Mr. Jim Strock, Secretary of Environment for California, to represent state environmental agencies and the National Association of Attorneys General has nominated Attorney General Dan Morales, your Attorney General, to represent state attorneys general on the DERTF.

Mr. Don Gray and Mr. Paul Reimer represent public interest functions on the DERTF. In addition to the nine members at DERTF meetings, we normally have the senior environmental people from middle departments and from EPA in attendance.

What's shown here are the main agenda topic items that we'll discuss in the two-day meeting -- 8th and 9th of May. The DERTF will be giving a report from one of its working groups on future land use issues, in other words, how should we collectively, our regulating partners and the Department of Defense incorporate future land use decisions into -- in other words, things that the reuse authority critically -- development corporations -- thinking about doing in the future with our decisions on cleanup levels and cleanup standards.

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We'll also be spending about half a day on the 8th getting some presentations on Kelly, its reuse plan, its environmental cleanup plan and we will be attending -- the folks at Kelly will be taking us on a tour of Kelly to show the members and the other folks attending the meeting what Kelly is all about and reenforcing some of the things about the environmental issues that the members are being informed about.

And, also, during the 8th, we hope to be attending your RAB meeting so that the members

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can actually see RAB in -- functioning as it's supposed to be. I would ask that if you do have comments that you want the DERTF to hear, that those comments be reserved for the public comment meeting on the 9th of May. The time that we are fixing for public comment is 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. A couple of the reasons for doing that: One, there's an awful lot of Kelly business that goes on in the RAB and our intention -- Ms. Goodman's intention -- is to watch the RAB at work and not to detract -- take away any time that you-all have -- or the RAB members have in dealing with Kelly's issues. That's the main reason. As I said, it is not the RAB going to the DERTF, but the DERTF coming to see you at work.

Ms. Goodman, I can tell you, firmly believes in community involvement and has been one of the leading proponents of community involvement and setting up institutions like the RAB to make sure that the community's voice gets heard in cleanup decision-making.

That basically concludes my presentation.

Do the RAB members have any questions for me?

MR. QUINTANILLA: Yes, sir. On

1	the first slide you showed you said it
2	studies and makes recommendations in ways to
3	expedite and improve environmental response
4	action at closing military installations. Is
5	this just for on-base and what about the
6	contamination that is off-base? Will you-all be
7	interested in that or not?
8	MR. CHOUDHORY: DOD, as
9	General Childress said before me, stands by its
10	commitments to do the cleanup for contamination
11	it has caused.
12	MR. QUINTANILLA: Off-base,
13	also?
14	MR. CHOUDHORY: If it was DOD
15	contamination.
16	MR. QUINTANILLA: Is there a
17	question where it might not be
18	MR. CHOUDHORY: At certain bases,
19	for instance, contamination starts off
20	off
21	MR. QUINTANILLA: No. Here in
22	San Antonio.
23	MR. CHOUDHORY: off base and
24	comes onto base and that's both a legal
25	complicated legal issue and technical issue.

1 MR. OUINTANILLA: How about when it comes from on-base to off-base? 2 3 MR. CHOUDHORY: I'm sure, as I've 4 heard in the last presentation, that the folks 5 at Kelly and with their partners from Texas and 6 federal EPA are working on that issue. 7 MR. QUINTANILLA: Would you be 8 interested in a presentation from the RAB as to 9 how fast -- how we can do the -- clean up the --10 off base faster than what is proposed -- in the 11 30 years it is proposed? Do you think that that 12 would be -- that you would be responsive to 13 that? 14 MR. CHOUDHORY: I do not want to 15 set the RAB's agenda for the next meeting. It 16 is up to you-all as RAB members to decide what 17 the meeting is about. It is your RAB. It's 18 here to do your business. 19 MR. QUINTANILLA: And all she's 20 going to do is just see how we operate, then. 21 MR. CHOUDHORY: That is the 2.2 main -- That is the purpose of her coming to the 23 RAB meeting. 24 MR. QUINTANILLA: And your 25 purpose is to make studies and make

recommendations on ways to expedite it -- expedite the cleanup?

MR. CHOUDHORY: One of the reasons why the DERTF has gone to many different bases and is planning on coming to Kelly is to see -- primarily, most of the folks that you saw are from the Washington area -- we work at policy level kind of things. Let's say things like public involvement is good. Go form RABs. Sometimes it is very useful to actually see what happens at a base, very useful to know what the concerns are so that we can take those concerns and determine if we are doing the right thing and whether what we are doing is really helping That's the reason that Ms. Goodman is you. coming here in May and the reason why the DERTF wants to sit in the RAB meeting.

MR. QUINTANILLA: To clean up the contamination in 30 years is not doing me any good, sir. That is not good.

MR. CHOUDHORY: I hear you.

MR. SMITH: This meeting in May, will we get more information on it? You had a date, but no place -- a time.

MR. CHOUDHORY: Thank you. The

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question was: Where is the meeting and is there going to be further information? Forgive me.

The meeting is going to be held at the Sheraton Fiesta, which is near the airport, and as we finalize the agenda, I'll pass that information on to Mr. Bailey's staff and he can provide that directly to the community and --

MR. SANCHEZ: You have experience with other RAB boards across the United States that are more or less doing the same kind of function -- you know, operating differently.

Some of the -- In other words, when Ms. Goodman or the task force comes here, if any of our members have some specific input they'd like to give the department -- or this task force in terms of the make-up of it -- well, of its own task force, would that -- would that be in line?

Many of the issues that seem to be occurring are being raised around -- at least this board -- and it seems to be the same thing with other RAB boards -- is issues of health -- health effects that may or may not be substantiated. The make-up of this task force in there -- and, again, I may be completely

misled -- they're primarily an administrative agency people that have nonhealth-related jurisdictions. How is this -- I mean -- and I'm asking this as a -- you know, as a question -- you know, not necessarily to make a statement. How is this being incorporated into these cleanups across the United States -- in other Air Force Bases.

MR. CHOUDHORY: The DERTF itself has gone to several RAB meetings -- I don't have the exact number -- I think about five -- I think -- over the past two years -- and not only for the good of the DERTF, but I think those nine members and the other people from the defense agencies, services and EPA, I think are concerned about the impact contamination will And, as I understand it, part of what we have. do in figuring out what needs to be cleaned up and how to clean up is considering the health risks and health threats. So, you know, the Environmental Protection Agency, California EPA, members of the task force are -- you know, that's what the agencies do. I don't know if I've answered your question or not.

MS. PEACE: By that meeting in

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1		May, do you think that off-base causes of
2		contamination will already have been identified,
3		too, that EPA can take a look at those, as
4		well?
5		MR. CHOUDHORY: Not being from
6		San Antonio, not being from the Air Force or
7		from Kelly, I cannot answer any specific
8		questions on what's going on at Kelly Air Force.
9		MS. PEACE: But do you think that
10		the people on this will be able to help us with
11		that?
12		MS. LIMON: Could you speak
13		louder, please?
14		MS. PEACE: Do you think that the
15		people on this task force will be able to help
16		us with that?
17		MR. CHOUDHORY: I'm not sure I
18		quite understand what you're asking.
19		MR. QUINTANILLA: Will all the
20		people that are on this task force be here
21		can they help us with this problem?
22		MS. PEACE: Well, I'm just
23		wondering if there's somebody from EPA that
24		they could then direct EPA into looking at if
25		there are any off-site off-base sources of

1 contamination, as well, so that those could be 2 established and cleaned up, also. MR. CHOUDHORY: There is a member 3 of EPA on the task force, but -- I mean, it's --4 5 if you really have concerns, there's the local 6 EPA regional office, there's an EPA member of 7 the BRAC cleanup team -- I'm not sure if that gentleman is here today -- but that would be 8 9 some avenues that I would suggest in raising 10 your questions -- and I'm sure Mr. Bailey and 11 his staff are well aware of your concerns. 12 MS. PEACE: Okay. 13 MR. SOLIS: Thank you, 14 Mr. Choudhory. 15 MR. CHOUDHORY: Thank you, 16 Mr. Solis. Before I leave, let me give you two 17 gifts. One is the last DERTF report for fiscal 18 1995, which was issued in December, and right 19 hot off the press is our directory of all RABs across the United States. 20 21 MR. SOLIS: Thank you, sir. 22 MR. CHOUDHORY: Thank you very 2.3 much. 24 MR. BAILEY: Thank you very 25 much.

Just to make sure that it's clear to everybody -- at least what our understanding is right now -- that the Defense Environmental Response Task Force will be in town May 8th and There is an agenda which is being put 9th. together right now. We'll be talking about later as to which day of the week would be best for us to have a RAB meeting so this group can be here. We want to make sure, as best we can, that all these DERTF -- use that acronym -people are here. We would prefer not to get one or two of them. We want to get all of them out I think there were some comments that were made, by not only Restoration Advisory Board members, but by some people from the community: Is there other opportunities other than that at a RAB meeting? Can we talk to them? The answer to that is twofold. On the 9th, there will be a time period for people to address this group. At the same time, we will pass back comments that there are people who would like to find out is there another opportunity time-wise for people from the community to talk to the DERTF group. So, what we will be doing is working very closely with

Mr. Choudhory's group -- and others -- getting the agenda as quickly as we can, get it out to members of the RAB -- should any member of the community wish to get a copy of it, please give If you need a name or a phone number us a call. or whatever afterwards, let us know and we will get you that information, also.

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If I could go into the next order of business, we have a presentation by Captain Ed Von Dran. Kelly Air Force Base has historically handed out various documents to RAB members. There's a lot of technical data that is in those documents and one of the comments that has come back from a number of people in the community is, "Take all the technical-ese out of it and present it in a way to where hopefully I can understand it. " So, we're going to make an attempt tonight to talk about one of the zones on the base -- Zone 2 -- which is the area that is south of Southwest Military Drive. It's located in the area where -- what we call the jet engine test cell. It's boarded on one side by Leon Creek and then private property off on that side. Union Pacific and Southern Pacific Railroads to the east and then

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Southwest Military Drive to the north. We have some maps that we'll be showing.

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It is important for us to show you -- so, what we're going to do -- the best way that we know how right now -- and we're very encouraged by feedback that we're getting from the community is -- we want to walk through this and show you where the contamination exists on the base and where it exists off the base. What we're proposing to do in the May time period is -- is to show it differently -- and that's for Zone 3, which encompasses the on-base areas and off-base in the Quintana Road area and further out into the community.

Now, the people have asked for it, so we're going to show that differently than what we do for Zone 2. Zone 2 -- we only have, really, one or two roads. We have Southwest Military Highway and some other roads on the base. For Zone 3 -- again, which we will be presenting in -- in May -- we're going to show the contamination and how it goes out into the neighborhoods by streets so that you have some idea as to what's happening.

I know we've got reports that are put

together, but people have come to us and say, "don't know what that line means. I don't know what that data means. Can you show it to me in a way that I can understand it?" So, we're going to start tonight with Zone 2 and then in the May time period go with Zone 3.

At this time, if I could pass it on to Captain Von Dran --

CAPT. VON DRAN: Thank you, sir. Tonight, we're just going to try to give you a little bit of an overview and an update on our efforts in Zone 2, as Mr. Bailey was just explaining -- and -- so, if I could have the first chart -- I'd like to tell you a little bit about what's going on out in Zone 2 -- but not only just in Zone 2 -- across the base.

We have a project that is actually known as the Basewide Remedial Assessment and the objective of that project is to gather data on an annual and also on a quarterly basis, depending upon the site, and evaluate that data to determine how well or how effective our -- our restoration activities are proceeding.

We also have several systems in operation in Zone 2 -- and we have a contractor on board

that operates those systems for us -- and primarily the systems in Zone 2 are groundwater pump and treat systems whereby we simply extract the groundwater that's affected and we send it through a treatment work -- and we treat the affected groundwater and then discharge it over to, at this time, our industrial treatment works that's on base.

We're also working toward developing final remedial actions. We're designing our final systems, not only for groundwater, but also for the affected soils that are in Zone 2 -- and I'll be showing you a few of those tonight -- and just to let you know that all of the data that we're gathering on an annual basis and also through our O & M efforts is being passed over to the remedial design contractor, so that when we do put in the final system or remediation, it is the most up-to-date and has all of the data that is currently available to make sure that we have -- we have addressed all of the issues.

So -- if I could have the next slide -- as Mr. Bailey has explained, you can see Zone 2 here is outlined in red. It is down on the southern end of the base and it contains our --

Zone 2 is this area here and it has the jet engine test cell and also -- excuse me -- and also our treatment works -- and we most -- for the most part, that's pretty much all that's located over at that section of the base at this time.

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If I can have the detail -- What you see here is a listing -- or a picture of all the different sites that -- as we've -- as we've been able to discover them in Zone 2. There are numerous sites. A couple of the sites up here are actually going through closure where there is no further need for any additional studies or remediation. What we do have -- if I can have the next chart that shows the systems -- there are several sites here that have -- needed some cleanup efforts and several years ago, we went ahead and placed some -- what we call interim remedial measures to take immediate action -and what we have done here was -- we have -we've put in systems on both sides of the creek in this area and also we have placed a cutoff trench system down here at the southern end of the base and also up here by a site we call E-3 -- which was a former evaporation pit used

with the industrial waste treatment plant -- we placed another recovery system in that area.

The next slide. What I'm going to show you here next comes from our 1994 Basewide Remedial Assessment -- and, still, I just want to draw your attention just to Zone 2. As Mr. Bailey has explained, we are going to discuss Zones 1 and 3 at a later date. But I just want to draw your attention to this and point out that these -- this report is at our repository, both in the library downtown and on-base -- and if you have a specific need, we can help you -- we do have a few other copies. We can help you obtain a copy if you want to -- or discuss these issues.

We're not going to run through all those charts. I just wanted to draw your attention to this chart and let you know that we do have a wealth of data contained in this report. This is -- This first chart here is basically summary data and we do have some details -- go to the fourth chart -- skip those three -- in an effort to try to show you that we do also have this very detailed data provided in this report -- most people really don't get all the way to

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Volume III of this report. This report is very extensive and -- but we wanted to make sure that you knew that we do have a lot of detailed data, not just the summary data that's been presented in the past to you here, but we have detailed -what we call isoconcentrations for different contaminants or chemicals of concern in those areas -- and you can see here we have -- this line here actually depicts the area of affected groundwater -- that would be -- this can be described as being affected at 100 parts per billion or -- or higher to the inside of this contour line here -- and if you go back to what is Appendix Q of the third volume, you'll see that we have quite an extensive listing of isoconcentrations or -- or maps of contamination and -- it takes quite a bit to wade through this data -- we realize that. If you would -- If you do need help to get into a report, we can be of some assistance to you in understanding what's being presented --

MR. CULBERTSON: Excuse me,
Captain, but I don't follow you. I don't follow
you. I don't know what chart you're
following --

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CAPT. VON DRAN: Those charts are not included -- The detailed charts are not included in your package. The detailed charts, as I was trying to point out, were included in the 1994 Remedial -- Basewide Remedial Assessment report -- and we just wanted to show you that this is an extract from that report and we just wanted to draw your attention to the fact that we have those detailed.

This report consists of about 160 pages of detailed contour maps and it would have been too much to provide those here in this -- in this meeting, but we wanted to make sure that you understood that those charts are available and they are contained in the report in the public repository.

We did take some of these charts on a larger scale. We've printed them out and they're on display out front tonight. If you would care to stop by after the meeting, we'll be glad to go over some of them with you and -and help you understand what you're looking at --

MR. QUINTANILLA: Captain, before you go any further, will you explain that

400-foot retrenchment wall? What is it for? 1 2 What does it do? What is it holding up? CAPT. VON DRAN: You're 3 concerning -- This. 4 5 MR. QUINTANILLA: The 400-foot 6 retrenchment. The trench. 7 MS. PEACE: CAPT. VON DRAN: The collection 8 trench at the -- at that -- is at Site E-1 and 9 it is -- was -- it's a cutoff trench -- and 10 basically what we've done there is we've --11 we've cut through the soil all the way down to 12 13 the Navarro -- or our confining layer --14 aquitard as we would call it -- and we have 15 placed a series of stand pipes and pumps in that 16 area and filled a trench full of gravel to make 17 it -- to make the water flow more easily through the gravel through the stand pipes where we have 18 19 pumped the water out to our treatment works. 20 These other systems --MR. QUINTANILLA: If you didn't 21 22 do that, what would happen? CAPT. VON DRAN: Well, that 23 system in and of itself was installed as an 24 25 interim remedial measure to try to limit the

impact that that site would have on the creek.

It was done primarily for health concerns. It was thought that it was better to take immediate action than to allow any potential contamination of the creek and then -- and then -- and then finalize the remedial action at a later date.

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These other items here, although depicted as solid bars, were only done this way for presentation purposes so that we could point them out to you. But these other -- this other -- this collection trench -- or this collection system along here and also around Site E-3 were -- in actuality, it's a series of wells that are used to pump the groundwater out of those areas.

MR. MURRAH: Now, that groundwater you're talking about coming out there, is that that shallow water aquifer --

CAPT. VON DRAN: The question was: Are we pumping shallow groundwater? And, yes, this is water coming from our shallow groundwater aquifer and is not -- it's -- it's going -- we're only going to a depth of about 30 or 40 feet in these areas. So, in the -- the -- where it begs the question is: Where is

. 1	our drinking water coming from? We have several
2	layers of material or different confining layers
3	of approximately 1,000 feet between our shallow
4	aquifer and the Edwards Aquifer, which is
5	approximately 1,000 feet below us in that
6	area.
7	MR. MURRAH: Do we know The
8	wells that are around there that that are
9	our are they do you know what aquifer
10	they're coming from that are on properties
11	next door?
12	CAPT. VON DRAN: Yes, we do.
13	MR. MURRAH: Are they from the
14	Edwards?
15	CAPT. VON DRAN: Are you
16	referring to the well that's immediately
17	off-base
18	MR. MURRAH: Well, there's about
19	five
20	CAPT. VON DRAN: or any well?
21	Yes, we do know where those wells are coming
22	from and and, no, we do not show any
23	indication of affecting
24	MR. MURRAH: But are they from
25	the Edwards?

1 CAPT. VON DRAN: Yes, sir. 2 MR. MURRAH: That is, are --3 CAPT. VON DRAN: Yes, sir. MR. SEGOVIA: Is there any 4 5 connection between the -- the area -- the 6 Quintana area with this zone here? Is there any 7 water coming through there or goes through there 8 from the Quintana area. 9 CAPT. VON DRAN: The question 10 Does this zone have any effect on the was: 11 Quintana Road area? No. The general 12 groundwater flow direction in this area would 13 actually be from the Quintana Road area back 14 toward Zone 2. 15 MS. PEACE: Would you have your 16 seven collection wells -- I mean, 15 collection 17 wells -- it looks like -- and 21 injection 18 wells -- so, are you-all going to be pumping the 19 water and then sending it through the treatment 20 plant and then reinjecting it in these 21 21 injection --22 CAPT. VON DRAN: The final chart 23 that was provided to the RAB members here comes 2.4 from our feasibility studies and it presented an 25 earlier solution or remedy that was being

proposed. At this present time, we are -- we have discounted the use of reinjection wells in this area because of additional work that was done in our numerical groundwater flow model of the base.

Yes, sir?

MR. RODRIGUEZ: I was going to ask: Was there any tests done on the -- in the Quintana Road area to the east or from Zone 2?

CAPT. VON DRAN: I'm not familiar with the area, sir.

MR. SMITH: It's the well south of Zone 2.

CAPT. VON DRAN: I don't understand the question, so could you --

MR. RODRIGUEZ: All I was asking is that -- I know that we talked about this area before, but I don't know -- I don't know that we did any testing to the east of Quintana Road -- and there is a couple of streets that go off Quintana Road south of Military Drive, one is Briggs and the other one is Pitluk. Did we do any testing on that far east of the base to see if there is any contamination in that area?

MR. SMITH: Captain, are you

1 familiar with that CPS power plant down there. 2 CAPT. VON DRAN: Yes, I am. 3 Just north of that is MR. SMITH: the first road he's talking about -- the road 4 5 immediately north of the power plant. 6 CAPT. VON DRAN: Okay. Well, 7 from all of our indications, we don't have 8 anything that would go nearly that far. We have 9 fully bounded the -- the extent of any effects 10 to that area in that direction. 11 MR. SANCHEZ: Captain, how far is that trench from Leon Creek? 12 13 CAPT. VON DRAN: That trench --14 The trench he's referring to is -- is our E-1 15 trench and that trench ranges -- I'm 16 venturing -- about 60 to 80 feet at its closest 17 point to the creek. 18 MR. SANCHEZ: Have you already --19 Are you pretty well -- Is it firmly established 20 that there's no commingling of Leon Creek and 21 the water that's going into the trench? 22 CAPT. VON DRAN: That trench, in 23 particular, sits up a fairly high -- it's a 24 little -- it's a hill right there -- and the --25 the bottom of the trench is keyed into the

Navarro clays in that area and it is still above 1 2 the level of the creek. So, we have 3 reasonable -- good assurance that we're not 4 commingling with the creek in that area. 5 Any questions? 6 MR. MURRAH: Where does it go to 7 then when it goes down that creek? CAPT. VON DRAN: Well -- The 8 9 question was: Where does the water go to in the 10 trench? The trench -- The waters that are 11 collected in the trench are pumped up to our 12 groundwater treatment plant and then processed 13 through -- and run through a process known as 14 ultraviolet oxidation -- and then -- right 15 now -- because we do have our own NPDES 16 permit -- our own permit to discharge directly 17 to the creek, it is processed a second time 18 through the environmental process control facility and then discharged with the waters 19

outfall.

MS. LIMON: Where is Zone 3 on that map there?

from the -- from the base through the permitted

CAPT. VON DRAN: Zone 3 is not on

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1 this map, ma'am. Zone 3 would be -- here is 2 Zone 2 -- and Zone 3 back up in this area -- in 3 the Quintana Road area. MS. LIMON: Would that include 4 5 streets of Holder, Fenfield, Mayfield and --6 CAPT. VON DRAN: Yes, ma'am. 7 MS. LIMON: Well, I wish you 8 would have had that map, because I think most of 9 us here live in that area. 10 CAPT. VON DRAN: Our objective 11 this evening was to address the issue of Zone 12 2 -- and, once again, provide some information 13 and background on the Zone 2 area. We'll be 14 addressing Zone 3 and the other zones at a later 15 date. As Mr. Bailey has said, we'll be doing that -- Zone 3 in May. 16 17 Yes, sir. 18 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: What kind 19 of contaminants were found in Zone 2 and where 20 can we find a public report of what contaminants 21 and to what extent --22 CAPT. VON DRAN: The question 23 What type of contaminants were found in was: 24 Zone 2 and where can we find the report? I can 25 give you a laundry list of contaminants that

I understood that

were found in that area or you can get the report which is at our -- the public library downtown. There's also a copy of a -- the report that I referenced at the beginning of my briefing. The 1994 Basewide Remedial Assessment Annual Report is at the downtown repository and also at the on-base repository and that's available for you to go through at your leisure.

that's why we were -- to find out what contaminants (inaudible) -- given us the answers --

MS. LIMON:

CAPT. VON DRAN: We have -- We are presenting those contaminants. We have a list of them out here. We have several chlorinated contaminants, namely trichloroethylene, dichloroethylene, vinyl chloride, perchloroethylene, chlorobenzene, benzene, arsenic, manganese -- manganese is a secondary health standard, but not really a contaminant of real concern -- but it does have a secondary health standard -- and we also have some concerns with chromium and also with nickel for our -- it's the primary list of contaminants that we have in the area

that -- that we're tracking at this time. 1 2 Yes, ma'am? MS. KNEUPPER: Have you-all 3 tested the water between -- between Briggs and 4 Pitluk on Quintana? Because I have noticed a 5 certain little taste that I don't like and I was 6 7 wondering, you know, if you-all have checked it -- between Briggs and Pitluk on Quintana. 8 CAPT. VON DRAN: Have we checked 9 10 the water between Briggs and Pitluk on Quintana Road? That area is primarily -- it's 11 12 upgradient or -- more or less, it's -- the water 13 from that area flows toward Kelly Air Force Base 14 and toward Leon Creek from that area. So, if 15 you're having effects in that -- of your water 16 in that area, it would come from some other 17 place further away from the base, flowing back towards the base. 18 19 MS. KNEUPPER: How can I find out 20 where it's coming from? 21 CAPT. VON DRAN: I'll have to 22 defer that question to one of our board members. 23 MR. RODRIGUEZ: It's me again. 24 We'll be by there tomorrow and we'll take a 25 sample.

1	MS. KNEUPPER: Thank you very
2	much.
3	MR. RODRIGUEZ: We just need to
4	make sure that it's you don't associate both
5	of the water sources and one is up here
6	the other one is way at the bottom. So

13	anybody that lives over there is here right now,
14	to be honest with you (inaudible)
15	CAPT. VON DRAN: The concern, as
16	I understand it, was that there is no one living
17	from that area currently at this meeting.
18	MS. MEDINA: We are from the
19	community (inaudible)
20	CAPT. VON DRAN: Could you repeat
21	your earlier concern for the benefit of everyone
22	here.
23	MS. MEDINA: It's just that
24	you're saying Zone 2. We don't live over
25	there. In other words, if you wanted to give

those people that information on Zone 2, you know, I think it would have been -- but you're -- but you're saying all this -- you don't serve your purpose -- you should be doing it so the people over there would know that -- at one of their schools. That doesn't -- We -- We're not in that zone.

MR. BAILEY: When we had sat down months ago, back when we were forming RAB, we talked to the various members and said, "Where would be the best location to hold the meetings to talk about all of the areas?" So, what we have a tendency to do is to go to various areas to give those presentations. There are people in here that are interested -- now, they may have left -- I can appreciate what you're saying. But next week when we come back -- next week -- next -- May -- whenever we come back -- we're going to be covering Zone 3, so we can go through that.

If there are better locations, we are more than willing to hear it. There are not too many people that live adjacent Zone 2 immediately that are impacted. But the purpose today is to show the people of the community this side,

which is where you live, that that zone is not impacting this side.

The questions that have come up from people in the past are, "Don't tell me. Show me." So, what we're -- Yes, ma'am. So, what we're doing here is just giving you an example of what you're going to be hearing next time we meet -- or the RAB meets -- but it's going to be focused on off-base by street. There are people who have indicated -- especially RAB Board members -- they want to know what's coming out this way so that when they go out in the community, they can talk to people --

MS. MEDINA: So, it's to also let them know?

MR. BAILEY: Yes, ma'am.

MS. MEDINA: Okay. Another

question I had: One of my nurse -- my neighbors -- I'm sorry -- excuse me -- my neighbor is a nurse. She works nights. She said -- Well, she showed me, as a matter of fact, last night that there are some numbers in orange -- 18 -- I believe 43 -- 40-something -- it's written on the sidewalk in her front yard and they put a stake in the yard -- you

1	know and she pulled it out. She didn't know
2	what it meant because she has little
3	you know, grandchildren and she didn't want that
4	stake there. She was worried they were going to
5	hurt themselves. What is What do those
6	numbers mean and what does the stake mean?
7	CAPT. VON DRAN: Well, I can
8	understand what you say about the stake being in
9	the yard, but I do not know what those numbers
10	mean. I It would have to be
11	MS. MEDINA: We want to know
12	what's going on there and
13	MR. BAILEY: If, in fact, there's
14	any question by someone relative to the stake
15	MS. MEDINA: Who put it there?
16	What does it mean?
17	MR. BAILEY: Right. You can
18	phone us. If we don't know, then we'll turn you
19	over to, maybe, someone else who might know. I
20	mean, obviously.
21	MS. MEDINA: Is it the water
22	board? Is it the City? Is it
23	MR. BAILEY: Well, we can only
24	tell you whether it's us. And then what we can
25	do is give you the name and phone number of

other people to phone to find out about that. 1 2 MR. MEDINA: I can call you? 3 MR. BAILEY: You can phone --Yes, with a phone number that we provide and we 4 will research to tell you whether there are 5 6 people that are going out to the site. Before 7 we go out and we actually do work in the 8 community, we go out there and let the community 9 know about it. This is not a surprise when we 10 go out there. If someone finds a stake in their yard, it's because they've agreed to it, if 11 12 we're going to do that. 13 MS. MEDINA: Well, she asked me 14 to ask that because --15 MR. BAILEY: Right. We will be 16 more than willing to -- if we don't know -- to 17 try and direct you to the proper place. 18 MR. EICHMAN: Mr. Bailey, what 19 information -- It's been a long time -- of 20 course, I've worked out there at Kelly 38 years, 21 you know, and every Friday they had a -- what 22 they call a big burn and I don't know whether 23 that was on Kelly Field or not, but you could 24 see it for a long ways -- you know -- it's every 25 Friday evening -- they -- they burn that

1 excess -- whatever it was -- you know, from the plating department -- or whatever it was. 2 3 guess that's one way they got -- got rid of it, you know, but they don't do that any more. 4 MR. BAILEY: I've worked there --5 6 MR. EICHMAN: That was on base, 7 now. 8 MR. BAILEY: -- 10 years and I'm 9 not aware of that. MR. EICHMAN: And that was on 10 11 base every Friday -- you know, it would go up in smoke you, know. 12 13 MR. BAILEY: If, after this 14 session -- We have people here that would love 15 to get whatever data you have on what took 16 place. 17 MR. EICHMAN: I don't have any 18 data. 19 MR. BAILEY: We're not familiar 2.0 with that. We'll be glad to --I was told that 21 MR. EICHMAN: 22 that's the way they disposed of all of their 23 hazardous stuff like that -- you know, in a pit. It's every Friday -- and you can see it 24 25 for miles -- just thick, black smoke, you know.

1		MR. BAILEY: We'll be glad to
2	<del>.</del>	get
3		MR. EICHMAN: That was on base,
4		now, but you don't notice it any more.
5		MR. BAILEY: It hasn't occurred
6		in the ten years and I'm not familiar with it
7		all. I don't
8		MR. EICHMAN: I don't know if it
9	·	went down to Leon Creek or where it went from
10		there, you know.
11		MR. BAILEY: Yes, sir.
12		MR. EICHMAN: But I do know that
13		that's one way they used to get rid of it and
14		that was on base at Kelly Field.
15		MR. BAILEY: We will have someone
16		talk to you right after this.
17		UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Excuse
18		me. My name is (inaudible). For clarification
19		purposes, you mentioned that Zone 3 would be
20		discussed at the May meeting. Are you talking
21		about the 8th and the 9th?
22		MR. BAILEY: Yes, sir.
23		UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: At the
24		Sheraton?
25		MR. BAILEY: No, sir.

UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: 1 Where are 2 those --3 MR. BAILEY: The proposed location will be here. We want to make sure 4 5 it's out in the community when they talk about 6 that. The meeting that the other gentleman was 7 talking about was on the north side of town to 8 talk about other issues. So, the meeting 9 regarding Zone 3 will either be here or at a 10 larger location so that we can accommodate more 1 1 people -- and we'll be talking to the RAB members -- finding out if this is suitable or if 12 13 we should get a larger location. But it will be 14 here in the community, not north --15 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Thank you. 16 MR. BAILEY: -- or east or west. 17 MS. LIMON: What was he referring 18 to at the library? I missed that. 19 CAPT. VON DRAN: I was speaking 2.0 of the City Public Library. 21 MS. LIMON: What -- What was --22 CAPT. VON DRAN: And also the 23 library -- the base library. 24 MS. LIMON: What would be found 25 there?

1 CAPT. VON DRAN: There's a 2 repository known as our administrative record 3 that is -- a copy of it is kept at the public 4 library for the general public to view. 5 MS. LIMON: Is that contamination 6 and all of that? 7 CAPT. VON DRAN: Yes, ma'am. Ιt 8 has all of our reports in it that are listed 9 in --10 MS. LIMON: I think it should be 11 published in some way to the residents that live 12 in the neighborhood. We -- Some of us can't 13 go -- especially me -- can't go to the library 14 to find out what contaminated -- what was 15 I think it should be printed in some 16 form that we can find our area or even the 17 surrounding area -- what was found -- instead of 18 us having to research. We would need you to --19 The library is there for any information we 2.0 need, but this --21 MR. BAILEY: We have copies of 22 the document that we make accessible to the RAB 23 members and one of the purposes behind the 24 Restoration Advisory Board is to go out into the

community and share that. So, if, for some

25

reason, you do not have access to the base, you 1 2 need to give us a call and we will get you a 3 copy to review. MR. QUINTANILLA: Mr. Bailey, 4 5 could an extension of that library that's on 6 base and the one down there -- be right here in 7 the school just specifically for Zone 3 as a 8 suggestion. 9 MR. BAILEY: That's a good idea. 10 We will take a look at it. 11 MS. LIMON: But in laymen's language, if possible, where we could understand 12 13 If you put big, old words in there -- you it. 14 know --15 MR. BAILEY: What does one, 16 two -- something mean? Is it here or is it there and what is it? 17 18 MS. LIMON: Yes -- in Zone 3, if 19 possible. 20 MR. BAILEY: That's what we're 21 going to do in May, for sure. We want to have 22 as big charts as we can -- not necessarily 23 here -- while that hopefully will be as large as 24 we can. We want to have them along the sides. 25 So, when people have questions about them, they

can go out and they can say, "I live on the corner of Fenfield and -- boom -- then they're going to be able to see by what we've been able to find to date is there some type of contamination out there towards them?

The other point that we want to stress when we get back to this is: Just because there is contamination, what does it mean? So, we will be going through that, also.

MS. LIMON: And, also, if

possible -- I mean, they could be like the side

effects of that -- chemicals -- or whatever -
that way people -- and there is some element

that they have -- you know, it would help them.

I think most of them -- There would be more

people here, but if they come they don't

understand what you guys are saying. So, my

comment -- you know, you just sit there and you

don't really understand.

MR. BAILEY: Well, let me try to tell you what we've done. We had a gentleman come from Armstrong Lab and talk to us and he gave us a real long presentation, which is what we asked for him to do. I was contacted by Ms. Paulera (phonetic) -- am I saying that

correctly -- with the Keep South San P.R.O.U.D. group -- and that same gentleman is coming in with a nontechnical presentation on health risks to explain it in a way so that you can better understand that.

This gentleman or team of people -- we're hoping that there will be others from the community that will try and find out -- just like what you're trying to do -- what does this really mean? Just because I've got contamination in the shallow groundwater, what does this really mean? This gentleman is a person who has that skill, who has the education, who is -- and has the capability to do just that. So, he will be -- I guess to your meeting -- if I can say this -- is that all right if I make an announcement? On the 25th -- a week from tonight at 7:00 -- at the Royal Palace --

MS. LIMON: Thank you.

MR. BAILEY: Yes, ma'am?

MS. CADENA: I just wanted to let you know that that screen that's above the stage will be available, if you need it at a further meeting. It's a 12-foot screen, if you need a

1 bigger screen. 2 MR. BAILEY: That's excellent. 3 Thank you. Other questions? 4 5 Thank you very CAPT. VON DRAN: 6 much. 7 MR. SOLIS: Thank you, sir. MR. BAILEY: Now, we'd like to go 8 9 to the next item on our agenda, which is the new 10 business -- and before we get to subcommittee 11 reports, I'd like to have Mr. Tom Culbertson, 12 who is one of our RAB members, provide some -- I 13 think very important information. 14 Tom? 15 MR. CULBERTSON: Thank you, 16 Larry. One of our City Councilmen is very much 17 interested in water. That's the City Councilman 18 Bob Ross. He sent out a notice to a number of 19 businesses as follows: If we augment the 20 springs of San Marcos and Comal, will we need to 21 drastically reduce our use of water from the 22 Edwards Aquifer during times of drought? 23 answer is no. 24 What steps can we take to move augmentation 25 forward? Come to the fourth in a series of

water forums to get the answer. The meeting will be held this Wednesday -- this Wednesday, March 27th at 7:30 at Trinity University, Chapman Center -- and he urges everyone to attend and become a part of the solution. This is a positive attitude. Thank you.

MR. BAILEY: Thank you, Tom.

If I could go and call upon members of the Restoration Advisory Board to see if, in fact, they have subcommittee reports that they'd like to present --

Okay. There was a technical subcommittee meeting that we had this last week. It was a very short one. It went over some points -- talked to the various RAB members, getting their concerns about how we could present information differently and how we could focus on different points. Tonight was one of our attempts to meet one of the objectives that these people had -- had talked about.

If there are no other formal subcommittee reports, I'd like to then discuss the next RAB meeting -- if I could, go to the very last item. As we've indicated two or three times now, we've got the Defense Environmental

. 1	Response Task Force coming into town the 8th and

25	think we should look at is because repeatedly

questions of health have come up and 1 including -- from the citizenry, "Why haven't 2 3 you come out and surveyed or questioned or done 4 medical surveys?" I would -- I think it's going 5 to be important for us to understand, because I don't think it's been understood that 6 7 constitutionality comes into bureaucratic 8 surveys -- and I think what we're having is 9 citizens concerned or confused about what can 10 and can't be done in surveying medical -- the 11 Metropolitan Health District can answer some of 12 that -- but there's some things you cannot do 13 while other things that you can do.

If there was a volunteer-type system set up, you could probably get as much information as you wanted. But bureaucratic or governmental agencies can't go out into the public and play big brother and ask you what your ailments, what your symptoms are -- and I think we're meeting a lot of confusion, spending a lot of time repeatedly answering questions about health concerns. I think we need a more definitive answer to the public about what constitutionally can be done medical survey-wise.

MR. SOLIS: Thank you.

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Mr. Sanchez, you had a suggestion?

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MR. SANCHEZ: Well, I'm not a constitutional lawyer, so I can't talk about But I do know that the -- this kind of health risk assessment that the Air Force is bringing -- that -- the people from Armstrong laboratory to meet with those people next Monday -- they'll talk about that particular -those kind of -- how they -- they resolve those issues -- and they don't do them with surveys. They have a specific methodology that they have researched and developed over many, many, many years to try to come up with answers for the public -- you know, and being as -- you know, being that it is a -- a fairly new science in terms of developing, you know, actual risk assessments -- so, I think that that meeting Monday night at the Royal Palace will be important to answer that question, because it is -- it's far more than I can just answer tonight -- or anybody else could.
