2	MR. BRECHEEN: Good evening. Are we set? Any
3	introductions we need to make?
4	MR. BOUDREAUX: We have one new guy, Greg Hazel
5	with Public Works.
6	MR. BRECHEEN: Great.
7	MR. ADAMS: If anything goes wrong, it's his
8	fault.
9	MR. BRECHEEN: A big responsibility. Minutes?
10	Any comments?
11	MR. BOUDREAUX: Did you like this?
12	MR. BRECHEEN: Did I hear a second?
13	MS. WIRGES: I'll second it.
14	MR. BRECHEEN: Okay, all in the favor of
15	approving the minutes?
16	RAB MEMBERS: Aye.
17	MR. BRECHEEN: All opposed?
18	(No audible response.)
19	MR. BRECHEEN: Ray said the motion and do you
20	need our names? Okay, let's quickly go around.
21	MR. KRAVITZ: I'm Rob Kravitz, Midwest

2 MR. BRECHEEN: Ready? Are you all ready to 3 start? Okay. These were briefed at the last meeting: 4 The base has been proposed on the National Priority 5 List, a portion of the base, what we call Operable 6 Unit 2 on the southeast corner of the landfills and 7 the Parkway area. The public comment period was 8 December and January. 9 We provided comments to the EPA and the 10 Village provided comments to the EPA stating our 11 concerns and our comments on the listing and how they 12 scored the site. So, now the EPA will review those 13 comments, and then make a decision if you want to pick 14 the site to be on the final listing on the National. 15 Priority List. 16 MR. ADAMS: What's the time frame for that? When 17 do they make the decision? 18 MR. SCHAFER: I would guess it's probably within 19 the next couple months. I would guess. ·20 MR. ADAMS: It's a little period of time. It's 21 not immediate? 22 MR. SCHAFER: Well, I guess one thing that might 23 make it a little bit different this year is decisions 24 of this level are typically made by people at the top,

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1 the final decision is. It's kind of hard for me to guage it for you guys because there's a new transition 2 3 team coming in with the new Administration, but it's 4 not anything that's going to happen soon. 5 MR. BOUDREAUX: They'll call our Mayor if they 6 have questions? 7 MR. SCHAFER: Yes, certainly. 8 MR. ADAMS: And do we get some formal notice 9 whatever the decision is? Or does it come to you, or 10 to Tim? What's the notification process once they 11 make whatever decision they make? Do you know? 12 MR. SCHAFER: It's my understanding that if we 13 decide to go forward, the site will be listed in the 14 Federal Register in the next couple of months. If we 15 choose, for whatever reason, not to move the site 16 forward, it might be we can go back and recalculate 17 the score perhaps. I'm not real sure what the next 18 step is for that. 19 MR. ADAMS: But I mean, other than listing in the 20 Federal Register, do they actually notify like the 21 Mayor? Or is that the only notification that's made 22 is in the Federal Register? 23 MR. SCHAFER: I'm not sure. I can check on it 24 for you. 6

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1 MR. KRAVITZ: They generally notify the 2 Congressional Office. 3 MR. ADAMS: The Mayor asked me. Okay, thank you. 4 MR. BOUDREAUX: Did you get a copy of the Mayor's 5 comments? б MR. SCHAFER: This is the first time I've become 7 aware of the fact that the Village had submitted any comment. I haven't seen the comments from either you 8 9 guys or the Air Force yet. 10 MR. BRECHEEN: I've got copies. 11 MR. BOUDREAUX: Just make sure he gets a copy. 12 MR. BRECHEEN: Any other questions on that? 13 MR. ADAMS: Could I ask one? Are we in a 14 position to discuss the City's position here? 15 MR. BOUDREAUX: I don't know, Gary. What do you 16 want to know, or are we not supposed to do that? 17 MR. ADAMS: We discussed this before. It's kind 18 of a mutual position that was stated by the Village. 19 Has that changed? 20 MR. BOUDREAUX: I don't have a copy of the final 21 letter. This is the one we put together. 22 MR. ADAMS: Do you have a copy for him? 23 MR. BOUDREAUX: Yes. 24 MR. ADAMS: Because I haven't seen a final copy 7

1	either. All I've seen is the draft.
2	MR. BOUDREAUX: Okay. Well, here is copy, and
3	essentially the Mayor preferred that it not go any
4	further, and the Air Force is committed to cleaning it
5	up and we're convinced that if they're telling us they
6	will, they will. So we would prefer it not be gone
7	into.
8	MR. ADAMS: I don't think it's a lot different
9	than the comments that he relayed through me to you
10	the last time we talked, but I don't remember. Of
11	course, I'll tell that you, and then it is. Look at
12	the letter first.
13	MR. BRECHEEN: After you look at it, if you want
14	to give me a call?
15	MR. SCHAFER: Sure.
16	MR. BOUDREAUX: Do you have that with you
17	tonight, so he can have it?
18	MR. BRECHEEN: About 50 feet that way.
19	MR. BOUDREAUX: We need to get this done first.
20	MR. BRECHEEN: Okay. One other topic that we had
21	slides with, but dropped out: Funding. And I guess
22	we'll start off with the not so good news: Drastic
23	funding cuts to all BRAC, Air Force, Environmental
24	Programs. Our Director, Mr. Lowas, sent a letter to
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the all the communities that are impacted by this, so all the BRAC bases, I believe it was the 18th of January.

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So he wrote the letter to the Village that basically stated Congress has cut the BRAC Program and DoD, which meant DoD cut into most of the services. The Air Force went from approximately \$230 million dollar 2001 program requirement to a funding of about \$100 million dollars.

10 So a \$230 million dollar requirement funded at \$100 million. So a fairly significant cut. 11 What 12 that means for Chanute is, we a proposed level of 13 effort that we are ready to execute. This entire team 14 is geared up and ready to go, but now we're funded at 15 about 30 percent of what we were ready to do. 16 MR. BOUDREAUX: 60 percent? 17 MR. SCHAFER: No. 18 MR. BRADY: Cut 60. 19 MR. BOUDREAUX: Cut 4.6 out of 10.6, right? 2.0 MR. SCHAFER: That was the second cut. 21 MR. BRECHEEN: But we wanted more than that. We 22 were prepared to execute on a larger figure than that. 23 So, what that means is we're going to have to 24 re-group, work with the agencies and everyone else on

what do we do with what's left to get the most bang for the buck, hit the priority sites, and complete what we need to complete.

And we're still committed to the cleanup, and from what I understand, the funding cut in fiscal year '01 rolls the money to fiscal year '02. So, come October 1st, that's a new funding cycle and we kind of receive back the cut we got now, so we have to work with what we have between now and the end of September.

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MR. ADAMS: We hope.

12 MR. BRECHEEN: Yes. So that's sort of the bad 13 news. The good news is I think we have a solid plan 14 for what's left. We can complete Landfill 1 and 15 Landfill 2, which are the two landfills that border 16 Salt Fork Creek, which are the priority landfills. We 17 can get those completed, we have a contracting team of 18 contractors that have kind of re-grouped and sharpened 19 the pencils to give us what we need with what we have 20 left.

We can also proceed with the project that looks at all the storage tanks, underground tanks, above-ground tanks, oil/water separators. Now that project will proceed. We're also looking at the

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1	Investigation in Operable Unit 2, the southeast corner
2	of the base, the Fire Training Areas, and all the
3	other industrial sites there, that investigation will
4	continue. The Investigation in Operable Unit 1, we'll
5	complete the Workplan and some field screening, and
6	we'll have to stop.
7	MR. BOUDREAUX: This will get you through when?
8	August?
9	MR. BRECHEEN: Depending on the speed at which we
10	execute, but we're looking at a July-August time
11	frame. We've got a great deal of activity that we're
12	geared up for. So we're looking at July-August being
13	kind of 100 percent spending on the funds that we
14	have.
15	MR. ADAMS: Then, theoretically October 1, there
16	will be some new funding level, yet to be determined
17	for sure; is that right?
18	MR. BRECHEEN: Yes.
19	MR. ADAMS: Okay.
20	MR. BOUDREAUX: And this is all Air Force
21	funding? It's not Congressional funding? Where do we
22	need to make our input?
23	MR. BRECHEEN: Congress made the cut.
24	MR. BOUDREAUX: That's what I thought. So that
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1 you know, they didn't cut anything out of the Air 2 Transportation Bill, interestingly enough. What 3 happened was is that the budget essentially was cut 4 across the board, like, what was it? Like, 10 percent 5 or something like that, Gary? 6 MR. ADAMS: I don't know. 7 MR. BOUDREAUX: Well, what happened was that 8 those areas that stayed at 100 percent, like the Air 9 Transportation Bill which is important for some 10 projects we have out here that we got funded for, the 11 other projects got cut deeper. So, that's what 12 happened. 13 MR. ADAMS: For all practical purposes, then that 14 means that the schedule especially for 3 and 4 and 15 whatever else is pushed back at a minimum until 16 October 1, 2002. 17 MR. BRECHEEN: That is correct. Well, October 18 2001. 19 MR. ADAMS: I mean, 2001, I'm sorry. This coming 20 October 1. 21 MR. BRECHEEN: That is correct, because we were 22 initially geared up, I mean, if fully funded, we're 23 gearing up to completing the clean-up of the base. 24 And we're looking at completing 3 this summer, and 12

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1 qetting a good start on 4, so, yes, that will be 2 delayed if no additional funds are received. 3 MR. ADAMS: So from our perspective (inaudible) 4 and for all practical purposes that thing is going to 5 stay shut down for at least another year. I mean, 6 that's what's happened. And I don't need to talk 7 about that, but for all practical purposes. 8 We just had a meeting about that the other 9 day, and we had a lot of people inquire about it. Ιt 10 used to be used a lot. It's a dead spot for now until 11 this is all done. So we might as well just not plan 12 on doing anything with that for another year. 13 MR. BRECHEEN: A portion of the fencing will be 14 able to be relocated, that type of thing for 1 and 2. 15 MR. ADAMS: That's only on the backside. That's 16 not around on the front side? 17 MR. BRECHEEN: Correct. So the fencing that goes along the creek and everything --18 19 MR. BOUDREAUX: -- it's got to stay. That's too 20 bad. 21 MR. FOTHERGILL: What about if these projects 22 were put on the super fund list, like Mr. Schafer 23 would like to see, wouldn't that force the Air Force 24 funding to go head with those projects? 13

MR. BRECHEEN: A very good question. Do you want to comment on that?

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MR. SCHAFER: I'd love to. Quite honestly, you know, this is the reason why we feel the site needs to be listed, because in the unlikely event that the Air Force is able to get more money, they've made cuts across the board all the way. Now, if the Air Force finds themselves in a position where they have money come June that the base can't spend for whatever reason or they come up with money from who knows where that they can spend on a site.

And Tim talked about the possibility of additional funding, and that's true. But I think the likelihood is going to be that the Air Force is most likely going to take that additional money and put it on the NPL sites, if there is additional money.

17 If there is additional money, in the 18 funding scheme of things since this site is not on the 19 NPL, it can't compete with all those Air Force Bases 20 out on the west cost, in the state of California that 21 are on the NPL. Because there's legal enforceable 22 agreements associated with those sites that basically 23 say you need to meet those milestones in these time 24 frames or you're fined.

1 So, obviously, the Air Force on those 2 sites, as a sound business decision, they ve got to 3 deal with those, because there's circumstances if they 4 don't, so they really have no choice. Another thing the City should be considered 5 6 about has to do with Operable Unit 1. We've heard 7 that that's going to -- by necessity because of the 8 funding now, it's going to come to a point where we're 9 going to get some of the introductory work done and 10 we're to have to essentially stop. And it's unclear 11 as to when we'll be able to start again, because even 12 getting money from next year, completing landfills is 13 obviously still a bigger priority certainly by 14 environmentalists. 15 So it kind of has a cascading effect. So a 16 point for the City is, until that RI and attendant 17 cleanup that needs to be done in Operable Unit 1 can 18 happen, there can be no more transfers of property 19 from the Air Force to the community. And I think 20 that's something that impacts you guys very directly 21 that you need to be aware of. So the longer things 22 get put out into the future, that just delays the City 23 getting their hands on the property and the 24 redevelopment.

1 MR. BOUDREAUX: I'd have to agree with you that 2 if there's a fineable situation, an NPL site that has 3 already reached a milestone that had to be met and 4 therefore a fine would have to be implemented if they 5 didn't do something, I would agree the money would be 6 put into that project rather than fines. But being on 7 the other side, okay, speaking from past experience, I 8 can tell you that those that perform get the 9 financing. 10 So our plan - and I believe firmly that our 11 plan has become so wonderfully aggressive compared to 12 what it was over the last eight years. Over the last 13 24 months, we've done an awful lot of work, an awful 14 lot of work that didn't get done over the previous 15 eight years. 16 Now, because we are performing, I think 17 you'll find that the Air Force would say hey, we would 18 love to get out of there get. If we can get it done, 19 we'll throw the money over there to get it out -- to 20 get the work done and get out of there. 21 MR. SCHAFER: I agree with you, Ray. I'm surely 22 not questioning the Air Force's good intentions. 23 MR. BOUDREAUX: No, they are resolved. 24 MR. SCHAFER: But the fact of the matter is this

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1 site is a BRAC '88 site, and the BRAC funding is over. 2 And, unfortunately, with the progress on this site, all those years that you correctly point out that work 3 4 didn't get done, those were the years when the BRAC appropriations were in place, for Tim's boss to go get 5 6 the money to deal with the site. 7 That opportunity has been missed, and those budgets aren't there anymore, and they won't be. 8 So 9 now, where all the other sites or a lot of the other 10 sites were cleaned up during that point in time, 11 Chanute is still kind of, you know, we've got the 12 lion's share still ahead of us. And, of course, the 13 Air Force -- there's a lot of good intentions here, and I believe that's the case. 14 15 But all the good intentions in the world 16 aren't going to get the site cleaned up. There's got 17 to be funding. So unless there's things done to 18 ensure the money is there, all the good intentions in 19 the world aren't going to translate into getting the 20 site cleaned up. 21 MR. BOUDREAUX: Do you really believe the NPL has 22 a better chance of getting funds? 23 MR. FOTHERGILL: Absolutely. 24 MR. SCHAFER: Yes. Yes, I do.

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MR. BOUDREAUX: Well, I don't know that that's 1 true, because there's so many of them. I mean, 2 3 there's a trillion dollars worth of work and a half 4 billion worth of financing, so I don't know whether 5 that's going to help or not. 6 MR. SCHAFER: From my perspective, the way I look 7 at it, is by making a simple business decision: If I 8 ask for \$10, and I need 20 to pay my bills -- or I 9 need 20 and I only get 10. I'm going to get fined if 10 I don't pay one of them. I'm going to put the money 11 where I'm going to get the fine. 12 MR. BOUDREAUX: Right, only if the area's 13 fineable that's out there, but it takes a long time 14 before you end up with any fines. 15 MR. SCHAFER: No, sir, it doesn't. 16 MR. BRECHEEN: Ray, I mean, you're exactly right, 17 because -- I mean, this is not an Air Force problem. 18 It's a problem that we've inherited. 19 MR. BOUDREAUX: That's right. 20 MR. BRECHEEN: But we have to be postured the 21 best we can so we can go get additional dollars. And 22 here's the message for the night. Can you all read 23 that? "Life's Not Fair." You know, I wish it was, 24 but the situation has come up, and this is the hand 18

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1 we're dealt with, and we're going to do the best job we can with the resources we have to get the 2 3 priorities and be postured very well to _ _ 4 MR. BOUDREAUX: -- accept the dollars when they do become available. 5 MR. BRECHEEN: Yes, sir. We are not slowing 6 7 down; we're not slowing down. We're going to keep working until September. We're going to aggressively 8 9 attack the problem until we need more money to 10 continue, and that's the plan to we're going to take. 11 We've got the right stuff in place right here. 12 MR. SCHAFER: That may have worked when there was 13 always a budget. I think you need to look at budget 14 reality. 15 MR. BOUDREAUX: We're not going to solve the 16 problem in this room. I'm just --17 MR. SCHAFER: Absolutely. 18 That's the way they want to play. MR. BOUDREAUX: 19 That's the game; that's the way it works. 20 MR. BRECHEEN: But Mr. Lowas did want to make the 21 community aware -- I mean, this is what he's received. 22 I mean, he's doing the best he can with the resources 23 he's been given. So that's kind of where we sit on 24 the funds. 19

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· 1	Are there any more questions on that?
2	MR. MITCHELL: Tim, what was your overall budget
3	supposed to be for this year, and what is the new one
4	with the new cut?
5	MR. BRECHEEN: Can we discuss it?
6	MR. ADAMS: Tim, what I think what he's asking is
7	you had said something about 230 million and it was
8	cut to a 100 million. That's the number that you had
9	talked about a little bit ago.
10	UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: AFBCA wide.
11	MR. SAHRE: That's not just for Chanute.
12	MR. ADAMS: No. That's the number that you had
13	originally, and then it was cut to \$100 million.
14	Everybody had, not you, but everybody.
15	MR. SAHRE: And your question specifically was
16	what's our budget proposed here?
17	MR. MITCHELL: That's in effect here, yeah.
18	MR. SAHRE: Well, the reason we hesitate is
19	because there are contractors in the room. I'm not
20	sure we're getting in a situation where we're telling
21	contractors what we are going to spend I'll talk
22	more about it when the meeting is over.
23	MR. SCHAFER: Without giving specific numbers and
24	respecting the Air Force's relationship with the
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contractors what it means is what we've asked for, Tim 1 basically has got something - and we haven't 2 3 calculated it down to the decimal point - but it's 4 somewhere between 25 and 30 percent of what we want. So we have somewhere between a fourth and third of 5 what we needed to get. Is that accurate? 6 7 MR. BRECHEEN: Very accurate, and that's because we had such an aggressive agenda. 8 9 MR. BRADY: That was just this year's programs. 10 MR. BRECHEEN: Correct. 11 MR. BRADY: That's not -- that was just this 12 year. 13 MR. BRECHEEN: Okay. We're talking about the 14 Landfills Investigation. That's something that is 15 fully funded. We're out on Heritage Lake. For the 16 first time, I guess in years, Heritage Lake froze over 17 and I had a great time with my family out there. Took 18 the sleds up on the hill, and you can go pretty far 19 across the ice. Those deep, cracking sounds, kind of 20 concerned. 21 But very safe, about eight inches of ice 22 out there on the lake, which is very significant. So 23

what we're able to do is cut through the ice and collect sediment sampling at the bottom of the lake.

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It's kind of one of the final steps of the 1 Investigation to see if there's any contamination in 2 3 the sediment that's in the lake. Our Draft Report is coming out the spring 4 of this year. This is for the four landfills and 5 6 Heritage Lake, five sites. And the Feasibility Study 7 will come out this year as well. It moves us to the Remedial Action capping of the landfills. You can see 8 9 at the bottom, we've shaped and graded the landfills 10 the year. Cap construction will be now be over this 11 year and in next year. Around March, hopefully the 12 13 soil will have thawed out, and we can start hauling 14 from the borrow source again. 15 MR. BOUDREAUX: You might want to remind 16 everybody - and the Mayor is very concerned about this 17 - that we finish digging the lake this year, even with 18 the cut. 19 MR. BRECHEEN: Yes, sir, and we've gone back to 20 out contractors to confirm the cubic yards removed. 21 It's going to be tight. 2.2 MR. BOUDREAUX: Going to be close. 23 MR. BRECHEEN: And I'll explain why on the next 24 slide. This here is the actual pond area, north of 22

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the base where they're digging. The blue area is the 1 drainage pond. The drainage pond is approximately 2 450,000 cubic yards. The amount of cubic yards 3 required on Landfills 1 and 2, which are the two we're 4 now able to complete -- 350 -- 300? 5 MS. KOZAK: About 250. 6 250. Which means there's 200,000 7 MR. BRECHEEN: cubic yards, minus the 50 already received, so there's 8 about 150,000 cubic yards after we finish 1 and 2 that 9 we still need to take out of the lake. 10 11 MR. ADAMS: So, the lake is not going to be 12 finished this summer. MR. BRECHEEN: Well, we're looking at a couple of 13 14 That is a very important goal for us. issues. 15 MR. ADAMS: Well, it's important, too, because the Mayor is under the assumption that it's going to 16 be completed this summer, and if it isn't, I think he 17 needs to know so that he's not making incorrect 18 statements that he's basing on information he had, and 19 20 if it isn't, I think he just needs to know that. It's 21 just important. MR. BRECHEEN: All this funding information is 22 23 fairly new. 24 MR. ADAMS: I realize that. 23

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1	MR. BRECHEEN: The old picture, when we were
2	doing Landfills 1, 2, 3, and maybe 4, it was not an
3	issue. So we're looking at a couple options: One,
4	depending on how we execute, there could be a small
5	amount of funds left on 1 and 2 to work on 3 which
6	brings us soil.
7	The second option is potentially
8	stockpiling some of the soil on the site. If we can
9	do that without a great deal of double handling.
10	MR. ADAMS: Just whenever you get some final
11	answer.
12	MR. BRECHEEN: Okay. So in 2001, we're looking
13	at some repair work along Perimeter Road, some
14	excavation, near and under the road, which we talked
15	about at the last meeting.
16	MR. BOUDREAUX: When we close that road, we just
17	need some kind of notice.
18	MR. BRECHEEN: And I'll work with you in the next
19	week or so. I need to get a letter to you with the
20	details of what we're going to be doing. It's not
21	just the solid caps, you know that, we have the
22	leachate systems and the RCRA caps as well.
23	Now in 2002 construction season, Landfills
24	3 and 4, we'll do the same thing at those sites: the

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1 caps, the leachate systems, and the RCRA caps. This is a picture of Landfill 2. You can 2 see the retaining wall on 3, where they've actually 3 4 excavated, and pulled back pulled back the waste and 5 the trash from the creek, so there will be a clean area between the landfills. б 7 The next large Investigation is what's 8 called the Base Wide, which takes care of sites in the 9 main area of the Base, and also in the southeast 10 corner, approximately 40 sites. Investigate the 11 sites, study what the alternatives are. 12 First of all, we'll look at the screening 13 level where we do sampling that's called 14 non-intrusive, where we can do a geophysical looking 15 for historical information. So, you'll see us out 16 there. There's some firing ranges, and we'll be out 17 doing geophysical surveys with like fancy metal 18 detectors out there that can detect lead that's spread 19 out or concentrated so we don't have to go digging 20 holes in yards and people's places of work. 21 All that will be done, and then the next 22 step will be collect definite soil samples and water 23 samples as needed. 24 Tim, why don't you want explain MR. BOUDREAUX:

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how you all found these, because these are all new, essentially. Remember we did a Base Wide Environmental Check in what? In 1991 and again in '93, and now we found all these others. Most of them from photographs, right?

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MR. BRECHEEN: You might be able to answer that better.

MR. SCHAFER: There was an Environmental Baseline 8 9 Survey that was done prior to my coming on the site. 10 It might be '91. I became involved in '93, so it was 11 before that. What we're finding now, I think quite 12 honestly, is that Environmental Baseline Survey quite 13 honestly didn't look at the buildings and the 14 operations associated with all these buildings to the 15 level it should have.

16 So we're finding what appears to be new 17 sites that maybe because that initial effort was very 18 narrow in focus, we weren't aware of these sites. And 19 we're finding things through like aerial photographs. 20 One site we've come to know about, there was a 21 gentleman that came to one of our RAB meetings and 22 those us that carbon tetrachloride had been routinely 23 spilled out, and that's how we found out about that 24 one.

1	So, it's a combination of things how we're
2	finding them. Right now, the Air Force is going to
3	I don't know if you've ever put Steve's list up, but
4	the Air Force, the guys here, have basically put
5	together a pretty comprehensive list based on all the
6	buildings and what went on in those buildings.
7	They've identified a lot of potential
8	problems out there. That's the thing that should have
9	been done in '91, and wasn't. So, sort of an
10	outgrowth of now taking a really good look at things,
11	there are things still coming out.
12	MR. BOUDREAUX: I think a lot of that happened
13	because of the early bases because they got what
14	they asked for, they just didn't asked for the right
15	stuff. And now they've asked for the right thing, and
16	they're finding a lot more information.
17	It doesn't mean that there's going
18	necessarily to be anything that has to be cleaned up.
19	It just has to be investigated, and it has to have at
20	least an evaluation, and that's what they're doing.
21	MR. BRECHEEN: So they're not new as in new
22	contamination, but they're new as in
23	MR. BOUDREAUX: Investigative reference.
24	MR. BRECHEEN: (continuing) newly understood
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potential sites. And the Air Force is committed to 1 due diligence. Even now, if someone comes forth -- in 2 fact, we talked about a former Base employee just last 3 week, who said hey, there was a potential that --4 there was a certain activity taking place in a 5 building that was not on our radar screen previously, 6 7 but after the BCT today, it is. So that's another building that we will do 8 9 due diligence on, even though it was not on the list 10 previously. So we're not stuck. MR. SAHRE: The number might be high, but the 11 12 fact that this has come to light is not. It happens 13 fairly regularly throughout the Air Force. Somebody 14comes up at a RAB meeting or with a letter or 15 someplace saying, we'll when I worked here, we did this here. But when the initial investigations were 16 done, that was never brought to light. It's a new 17 18 site, therefore it's established that we have to go 19 out and investigate. You just can't take somebody's word for it. 20

20 You just can't take somebody's word for it. 21 Otherwise, you'll be digging holes here for the rest 22 of your life. It's not an uncommon thing. The number 23 is higher, but to have to go back and redo that is not 24 uncommon.

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MR. BRECHEEN: Or reuse. When you're out digging 1 a foundation some day, you find something. 2 MR. BOUDREAUX: There's stuff out there. 3 MR. BRECHEEN: And that's why the laws are in 4 place. The Air Force always has the liability for 5 that type of incident. 6 MR. BOUDREAUX: Which reminds me, 519 OWS, is 7 that clean? And can we use that now? The Rec 8 9 Department wants to go ahead and wash trucks in the 10 bays. UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Carl Thomas. 11 12MR. BOUDREAUX: Is that him? 13 UNIDENTIFIED SPEAKER: Rich Thomas. 14 MR. BOUDREAUX: Rich Thomas? 15 MR. BRECHEEN: Yes, got a message from him today. 16 MR. BOUDREAUX: They want to go ahead and wash 17 trucks, and I think that's been investigated and 18 cleaned. 19 MR. BRECHEEN: That is correct. We'll be 20 discussing that tomorrow at the BCT. 21 MR. BOUDREAUX: But you're going to be sending a 22 letter out to him that's it's turned over so he can 23 use it? In fact, we'll give him a call 24 MR. BRECHEEN: 29

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after the meeting.

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MR. BOUDREAUX: Great. Okay, thanks. 2 3 MR. BRECHEEN: We got through the planning stage, the screening, and we'll be collecting data starting 4 5 this spring as soon as the weather turns. We had hoped to do it all this year. We were going to do the 6 7 whole Base, hit it all, hit hard, and now it will be 8 this year and next year, okay? 9 The non-CERCLA sites, all the storage 10 tanks, that type of thing, I wanted to show a couple 11 things: One of the things we've done on the Base 12 Wide, see if I've got this -- can everyone see this 13 okay? What we've done is, this is the way we have 14 been doing business. 15 We collect a sample, by the time you can 16 see it on a table, and it's usable, it's 93 days, even 17 for residential well sampling. The new way we're 18 doing it, the time between collecting a sample to it 19 being available is 37 days. That's cut by a third. 20 That incredibly significant because that means we can 21 make a decision in a month, instead of decisions in 22 three months.

That means when we go out to a resident's well, in 37 days, we're writing them a letter with the

1	results, instead of as we did it before. So we can
2	provide the information to the public quicker. I'm
3	not saying that's not better quality, and when we
4	we're doing our investigation, oftentimes we'll go and
5	investigate, find something, receive the data, the
6	information, and say, okay, we need to do some more
7	sampling, receive that information, then we need to do
8	the final sampling. So there's several iterations,
9	and now we've cut iteration down by a third.
10	MR. BOUDREAUX: Give yourself credit.
11	MR. BRECHEEN: Cut it to a third, not by a third.
12	MR. BOUDREAUX: That's thunder.
13	MR. BRECHEEN: Non-CERCLA sites. Okay, we've got
14	two charts here.
15	MR. ADAMS: You're not asking us if we can read
16	that one?
17	MR. BRECHEEN: This is conceptual only. What
18	we've done and what Dave Heidlauf and his group has
19	done, we have put together a road map. This is all
20	the decisions that we're going to make for the next
21	two years on the underground tanks, above-ground
22	tanks, oil/water separators, and fuel sites on the
23	Base.
24	It's all the decision points, okay.
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Agencies Review Draft Final Workplan, mid-March and 1 April. Agencies approve plan, yes, okay. No, revise 2 3 and re-submit. And we walk through all the steps. What this creates is kind of a checkbook balance 4 ledger which right now, open sites, current status is 5 213, okay. Underground tanks, fuel tanks, oil/water 6 separators, above-ground tanks, other sights. 7 In April of this year, if we get the 8 workplan approved, this is what drops out, 125, and 9 we're left with 88. And there's about six key 10 activities to take place over the next 18 months or 11 12 This is what comes off on every one of them, so.

13 leaving a balance of this, and getting hopefully down 14 to 0 in 2002 on the non-CERCLA Sites.

15 The trail is a little bit longer on the 16 CERCLA sites, again, impacted by funds, about a two or 17 three months split. So instead of September, it will 18 then be December. But this is the type of planning 19 that we're doing to show our Management we know what 20 we're doing, we have a clear plan of action, give the 21 regulators up front and early what we're doing so they 2.2 agree and know what we're doing.

And that's the way that we're sort of developing our plan of attack. As you can see, a huge

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number of sites that we're conducting investigations 1 We've conducted 90 soil borings, soil samples at 2 on. 20 sites. Looking at the fuel sites at 950, taking 3 out all the old sites. 4 5 MR. BOUDREAUX: I talked to the people that rent that, and they're probably going to paint that this 6 7 summer. And because it is not yet that bad, they'll 8 just be able to paint it. 9 MR. BRECHEEN: The tanks? MR. BOUDREAUX: Yes, and that was recommended by 10 11 you guys. You probably ought to paint it now. 12 MR. BRECHEEN: Good. Also prepared a lot of 13 documentation. 14 Now, this is what we plan to do, if you see us out in the spring and summer and all the way to the 15 16 fall next year. It's a lot of steps. You think 17 filing your taxes is paperwork, closing out one of our 18 sites is like filing taxes 213 times. 19 So, a lot of paperwork that these guys are 20 doing. We've got the right team in place, who 21 understand the regulations, so we get it right the 22 first time. It's a tremendous amount of work. 23 MR. KRAVITZ: That's right. 24 MR. BRECHEEN: Okay. That kind of concludes the

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slides. Are there any other questions or comments 1 before we move on for Reuse? Lorraine? 2 MS. WIRGES: Do you have anything to report on 3 the private water samples? 4 MR. BRECHEEN: We conducted sampling December 12 5 through 14 -- back up a second. We had a RAB meeting, 6 met with the citizens, had a sit-down with them, and 7 requested from them that they allow us to continue 8 sampling. Because as of yet, we do not know the full 9 10 picture of the groundwater leaving the Base. So that's one of the key projects we're 11 focusing on, but we don't have the full picture, and 12 we're working hard to understand it. But until we 13 understand it, we think the responsible thing to do is 14 continue sampling those residences. 15 16 MS. WIRGES: Three? Three residences? 17 MR. BRECHEEN: Four. We requested from them, but it's still their property. We let them know kind of 18 where we're at with the Investigation, that there is a 19 period of time, potentially, a year or more, before we 20 21 know the full picture. So we would like to do quarterly sampling, 22 every three months, of their private well, provide 23 24 them the information, provide it to the Illinois

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Department of Public Health, as well as do an independent assessment of that information, which they provide to the residents. So they get our version and the Department of Public Health's version, or their interpretation. So they agreed to do that quarterly, so we were able to do a re-sample in mid-December.

7 We promised them to write them a letter 8 within 45 days of the sampling, and we did. So we 9 sent them a letter. Sampled then the 12th through 10 14th of December, sent them a letter out toward the 11 end of January with the results, and our results are consistent with what they've always been. A proposal 12 13 is to go back in March. So in that letter to them, 14 the thank you for letting us sample, we said we'd like 15 to come back out on a quarterly basis. 16 MS. WIRGES: Good. Thank you. 17 MR. BRECHEEN: Does that answer it? 18

MS. WIRGES: Yes.

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19 MR. ADAMS: One quick question: I think it's 20 Landfill 3, I believe, the water line relocation, will 21 that then be next year as well? Or do you know? 22 MR. BRECHEEN: This year as soon as --23 MR. BRADY: Due to the cost. 24 MR. WEBER: We had a projected time schedule for

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1 that. It's almost -- we plan on it. 2 MR. ADAMS: Are you going to get a permit from IEPA for that? 3 MR. BRADY: We already got it. 4 5 MR. ADAMS: I was just talking to Springfield 6 about another issue today is the reason I ask the 7 question. 8 MR. BRADY: We got both of them: One for the water line and one for the sewer line. 9 10 MR. ADAMS: Okay, thank you. 11 MR. BRECHEEN: Reuse? 12 MR. BOUDREAUX: Reuse is progressing as always. 13 It seems to be going okay. I think probably the one 14 we should talk about tonight may be the opportunities 15 for Hangar Number 2. We had talked a little bit about 16 that previously, but currently, we have two or three 17 different options on that building, and we're working 18 finally to get some reuse in Hangar Number 2. 19 It's been kind of the stepchild; it hasn't 20 been used. So we're focusing on that building to get 21 some good reuse in it. Other than that, we're so 22 busy, we can't keep up getting packages out to people 23 inquiring. There's a lot of it activity out there. Ι 24 don't know where it's all coming from, but there's

1 just an awful lot of activity. We're getting calls for packages on the 2 3 Internet, we're getting calls on the telephone. There's people stopping by the office early in the 4 morning saying hey, I need this, this, and this, and 5 no, you can't know my name, and no, you can't know 6 what company I'm with, and no -- just give me the 7 I'll see you on Sunday or something like that. 8 data. So, it's guite exciting right now and guite 9 busy just responding to all that activity. I'm sure 10 everybody read in the paper some of the layoffs and 11 12 those kinds of things that's happened to industries 13 here, in the nation, and all over the country. We've 14 had meetings, Gary and I meet with the industrial 15 managers every three months. And essentially what they believe is the 16 17 first guarter is going to be a kind of a bloodbath all

over the country, but it looks like it's going to pick up in the second quarter and the third quarter. Unemployment rates were 1.9 in December, and they're forecast to be over 3 in the month of February. So everything is changed. But it hasn't decreased the amount of activity we're seeing. So, unless there's questions, that's all I have.

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MR. BRECHEEN: Okay, any other comments? 1 MR. BOUDREAUX: I quess April is the next 2 3 meeting. MR. BRECHEEN: Yes, sir. 4 5 MR. SCHAFER: Is this date correct? MR. BOUDREAUX: It's every two months now. 6 MR. BRADY: Yeah, the 1st is on a Sunday. The 7 5th is in the first full week. 8 MR. BRECHEEN: What we'd like to propose is that 9 we move the RAB back a week, if we can all do that. 10 MR. ADAMS: To the April 5 date? 11 MR. BRECHEEN: Yes, if the April 5 could be moved 12 13 to April 12. 14 MR. BOUDREAUX: Oh, back the other way, okay. 15 When is Easter? MS. WIRGES: Before Good Friday? That's Holy 16 17 Thursday night. MR. ADAMS: How about Wednesday? Wednesday is 18 19 all right. MR. BRECHEEN: It's all right with me. 20 21 MS. WIRGES: Bridge club. 22 MR. ADAMS: Never mind, Gary. Sorry. You're not going to compete with Bridge Club, unless Tim wants to 23 provide a room for the rest of the Bridge Club, and 24

Lorraine can come in here to take a break and then go 1 2 back. MR. BOUDREAUX: What happened to the 5th? What 3 hurt us there? 4 MR. SCHAFER: Some conflict. 5 MR. ADAMS: So we're going to do it on the 11th 6 7 then? Is that what I heard, or no? MR. ADAMS: Can you get an excused absence for 8 9 that one night? MS. WIRGES: Yes, I guess I can be excused. 10 11 MR. ADAMS: I'll write you an excuse. So it's the 11th. 12 13 MR. BRECHEEN: Yes, sir. 14 MR. BOUDREAUX: Have Linda put out notice. MS. KOZAK: Tim, maybe move the time, if it would 15 16 work for Lorraine? 17 MS. WIRGES: Don't worry about it. No problem it's church every night that week. 18 19 MR. ADAMS: We can meet early. 20 MS. WIRGES: No. Don't worry about it. MR. BRECHEEN: Is this scheduled every two 21 22 months? 23 MR. BOUDREAUX: I'd like to meet earlier in the 24 day, but it all depends on the other RAB Members.
