   prenegotiated rates that they had established with us.
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And I asked them to submit the quote to us by the 29th of July.

on the 29th, I had only received two quotes, one from Neathery and one from Geomatrix. I went back and asked that -- I wasn't aware, when I asked them specifically to submit by the 29th, when I only received two of the quotes, I was under the assumption that Clearwater did not want to respond to us. Since then, I was told that he -- I talked to him today. He mentioned to me that he had submitted the quote; so because of that, to give him the benefit of the doubt, I asked him that I would also accept his quote today if he would send it to me and he did, and you have that in front of you. Now you have all three quotes in front of you.

So based on that, I'm giving the TRS

Committee the opportunity to make that selection, with
the understanding that all three of them have equal
qualifications, and you just need to tell me why, once
you select one. If it happens to be a higher price one,
I need to justify why we're going to a higher priced
contractor, and I need to be able to justify that. So
if you would give me that justification, if indeed you
do go with a higher priced one, we'll entertain that and
make sure that we can -- that I can write that up in my

First of all, I want it noted - this is Rodrigo Garcia.

I want it noted that we're spending this extra money -
TAPP money on this Semi-annual Status Report because

(inaudible) is not doing their job and doing executive

summaries in laymen's terms that we can understand on

that whole entire report. And I hold the AFRPA, and you

people, responsible for not forcing them to do the job

that they're paid to do. They're paid a lot of money to

do this job, and they're not doing it correctly, and

that's the fault of you people and the AFRPA people.

Second, I need for you and the AFRPA to give us a status report on how we stand in getting on our funding for our next round of TAPP money, where we stand. We submitted -- done all the paperwork and everything. After we spend this money, what's the status on getting more money for TAPP?

Third, if you RAB members will notice -and I've seen this TAPP -- I mean, I've seen this
Semi-annual Compliance Report. It's very detailed and

very involved, and I've noticed the difference in these three bids. And if you look under technical review, you'll see that Clearwater Revival has called for 50 hours, and I believe Clearwater Revival will do a better job, because it takes about 40 to 50 hours to fully go through that Semi-annual Compliance Report; and after fully going through that Semi-annual Compliance Report, to rewrite summaries and rewrite and do the layman's term report so we can understand what's in that report. That's why I support Credence Clearwater (sic), because they have a much broader sense of responsibility and must broader sense of what this project entails in saying it's going to take 50 hours of technical review in order to get this project done correctly.

You cannot sit down and read that whole what is it now; five volumes - five or six binder
volumes in 12 hours or do it in 30 hours. I don't think
that's possible. Coming from an engineering background,
and working on all type of engineering projects and
knowing a lot about compliance with EPA laws, and other
things like that, I don't think they can do it in 12 or
30. That's why I support Clearwater Revival, because 50
hours is more of a reasonable amount of time, in my
judgment, that it would take for some technical person
to fully review and transpose it down to what we want it

Clearwater makes better presentations, explains more and spends more time with us explaining the different things -- the different findings, if you . analyze the reports; but again, you know, I have one vote, Rodrigo has one vote and that's the justification Why do we need a peer review? We've already for it. had the contractor that does the work, it has cost possibly the taxpayer - you, me and the others - several hundred thousand dollars for that corrective measure study on it; and then we're asking for someone to explain that to us in words that we can understand, and that's all that's happening. And for him to have a peer review of \$675 at \$135 I think is unnecessary. MR. GONZALEZ: I have one follow up question on the cost: Did Clearwater provide information for -- I notice that most of these are capped in the number of hours by rate; but then Clearwater has an additional dollar amount by the
