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Regarding the spill incident that

occurred -- I believe you're talking about the one recently that was in the newspaper.

MR. QUINTANILLA: Yes, sir.

MR. BAILEY: There was a chemical that we found that was in the water, but that is a storm water outfall -- an outfall opening through onto Kelly Air Force Base -- which leads into a basin and, then, the basin water can, at times, go into Leon Creek.

It was discovered in the afternoon and further analysis indicated that the constituent comes from one of the -- what we call BRIN

was there. So, I don't have that information. I'll be glad to provide that once we get that. We don't have the final report, yet.

MR. QUINTANILLA: And the extent of the fish killed were just a few minnows; is that correct?

MR. BAILEY: Was in it the basin area -- not in the creek -- but in the basin. There's a basin right there at the end of the outfall and that's where some of this chemical got into -- there's an overflow from the storm water outfall. As soon as it was found out that there was some type of fish killed in the area, we, as a matter of policy, divert the water. We have that -- the capability to divert the water from that area back to the industrial wastewater treatment plant. So, all the water in that storm water outfall -- from the time we found that out to the current time -- is being diverted back to the plant.

MR. QUINTANILLA: Thank you very much.

GEN. MURDOCK: I think -- but I don't want to speak for Gordon -- that when they came

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solutions that is now used, not only at Kelly, but throughout private industry and through industry overall. It's a chemical that is used to take the place of perchloroethylene -that's one of the chemicals that we've talked to you-all about and it's perc as it's commonly called. Well, this is a chemical that Kelly Air Force Base found as a suitable substitute years go.

Since that time, when the suitable substitute was found -- it was called Citri-Clean at the time -- there have been different modifications to that chemical which we use on the base. So, it was a chemical that was found. We have gone back up into the shop areas. There are a number of shop areas in the Kelly industrial complex where it's being used and, right now, we are determining specifically how that chemical got from one of these shops into the storm water outfall.

MR. QUINTANILLA: Approximately, how many gallons?

MR. BAILEY: Well, it's difficult to tell right now, because the water was diluted. In the storm water outfall, there is water that

Gordon -- that the chemical was not found in Leon Creek nor were there any dead fish in

Leon Creek, but I have not seen your final report. So, I'm just basing that on hearsay

and I'd ask you to speak to the RAB and tell

them what you-all discovered.

MR. BANNER: I think the regional office, which responds -- from the Austin office -- I think it's the regional office here in San Antonio that responds to those spills.

We had an investigator come out and I think he has put together a report. Maybe Abbi Power with the TNRCC regional office can speak more to when that report might come out and what might be in there.

Abbi, have you spoken with the investigator?

MS. POWER: Yeah. The day after the incident occurred -- as Mr. Bailey indicated. it was noticed late in the afternoon. We were contacted the next day. Staff from my office went out, as well as staff from Texas Parks & Wildlife out of the San Marcos office -- came down and inspected the area.

There were some small minnows, perch, in this concrete-lined basin. It's not a natural basin. It's a concrete-lined basin. They inspected both upstream and downstream from where the basin exits into Leon Creek. They used some basic analysis and hand-held meters to determine if there was any impact ongoing, and at the time of their inspection did not find any impact, either upstream or downstream from the basin, and concluded that, to the best of their knowledge, the Citri-Clean solvent or Citri-Clean substance probably had not reached the basin -- or the -- the actual confluence of the basin with Leon Creek.

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GEN. MURDOCK: Would the RAB be able to get a copy of that report when it's available?

MS. POWERS: Basically, what it was -- because it was such a small quantity, I believe that this is only going to be entered into the database and I can see if we can provide you a copy of the database. The database does have fields for comments -- where the inspectors will put in comments of their findings.

And, so, that -- that part of the reporting process did work. And as I was walking out of the office, I debated whether I should bring that report or not and I chose not to. So, I apologize for that.

But, basically, it is not a reportable quantity and, so, therefore, it's -- it was determined that it's not an issue as far as the LAPC is concerned.

GEN. MURDOCK: Okay. George, you had a question?

MR. RICE: Yeah. I'd just like to make a comment about reportable spills -- and I understand the Air Force doesn't define what a reportable spill is. However, I think this is to-the-point stuff -- that if something that can kill some fish, you know, in a basin, it's pretty serious, but it's not reportable. So, a lot of things may happen that are serious, but because they're not reportable spills, we won't be aware of it.

GEN MURDOCK: Well, again, I'm a novice and don't understand this business, but it seems to me that the Air Force has no involvement in determining what is reportable. I believe the regulators, probably, determine that. So, it's not up to the Air Force.

MR. RICE: That's right. You don't have a say in what's a reportable spill. That's in the regulations. You don't have any control over that.

GEN. MURDOCK: So, it's not Air Force judgment as to what to report.

MR. RICE: It's not anything that you

So, Dick, if you would -- please come forward.

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MR. WALTERS: Good evening. I'm Dick Walters.

Can you hear me? It's working.

I'm the public affairs specialist working with the environmental program at Kelly and I'd like to speak to you a few minutes about the public participation and public involvement opportunities that you have at the present time.

This month, we are very rich in opportunities for the RAB members, for the members of the community, for all our neighbors around Kelly, to have an opportunity to look at what we're doing, to review it and, then, make comment.

At the last RAB meeting, William Ryan had a chart that showed the RCRA closure plans that would be submitted the first week of November to the Texas Natural Resource Conversion Commission. Those plans were submitted. There was an ad that was run in the San Antonio Express-News, also, in La Prensa. So, the notice was out there, just as we said it would be at the RAB, and those documents were made available. There was, however, a slight glitch

in getting one of the documents to the library on the first day, and, as that was pointed out to us, the TNRCC looked at the public comment period, wanted to be sure the RAB had an opportunity to comment. So, this has been extended to the 29th of January.

Tonight -- earlier, we held a meeting on the Class 3 modification to our permit and compliance plan and that is the groundwater cleanup for Site S-8. Tonight, we have a display that is here in the meeting room, which you can take a look at at break time. Public comments on this proposal from Kelly Air Force Base are due to the TNRCC the 14th of February.

MR. WALTERS: It is the 12th of February. I stand corrected.

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to announce that there will be a public meeting on those plans next week on the 28th. It will be at Dwight Middle School at 6:30 -- and that's a public meeting that the TNRCC is putting on similar to the one that Kelly put on this evening for the Site S-8 -- and I handed out a sheet and some of you might have found that on your table -- there's a few at the back, as well -- on that public meeting.

MR. WALTERS: We'll have a slide on that about two more slides down.

We are also having a public comment period on an Interim Remedial Action also known as an Interim Stabilization Measure for Site S-1, which is located across the fence from the North Kelly Gardens neighborhood. Here, we will be removing sources of groundwater contamination. Public comment period began on the 30th of December and will run until the 29th of January. I would like to point out that this one is different in that it's not a TNRCC public comment period, but this is a voluntary one such as we've run in the past under the CERCLA and the Installation

Restoration Program process. In other words.

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For all of these, the closure plans, the Class 3 modification, the S-1 interim remedial action, you can find copies of the documents, if you're a RAB member, by going to the Technical Review Subcommittees' library and St. Mary's University community co-chair, Dr. Lenc, maintains that and can give you instructions on how to access that. You can go to the San Antonio Central Library at 600 Soledad. It's upstairs in the government document section. If you go there, you'll find a copy of the documents. The TNRCC regional offices here in San Antonio at 140 Heimer; you can also make a drive up to Austin to review the documents; and, finally, you can look at the documents at the Kelly Base library.

MR. QUINTANILLA: Oh, I have a question on that.

MR. WALTERS: Yes, sir?

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MR. HAGELTHORN: I'd like to add a comment to that, if I could, please. About -what was it -- 18 months ago -- two years ago -- when -- we made the decision to put a lot more emphasis and more power structure into the TRS. The reason we did that was to take some of this -- administrative actions away from the business dealings of the RAB, have it discussed in the TRS and the TRS would report back to the whole -- to the full RAB.

If we go back and we say, "Okay. We want all this stuff presented at the RAB, again," we've just come a complete circle -- a full circle back around from where we were two years ago. I, personally, don't think we need to address that.

MR. QUINTANILLA: Well, right now, none of the documents are being reviewed that I know of by the -- by the TRS.

MS. HUERTA: Is there -- on our agenda, is there a place for the TRS to come in and report back to us?

DR. LENE: It is available right now? Okay. The date I have is the 21st and --Okay. So, it is now available? Good.

And, then, we also -- the OU-2 Zone 4 work plan, which should be available, according to my notes, the middle of next month -- the 15th of February.

We also began discussion on the next TAPP application and this where we're going to need some help. We're not quite sure what we want to apply for. Yes. We do want to apply for money. But we want to know what we're going to do with it. One suggestion was to use that money as a basis for doing some training for RAB members -- RAB -- people who are on the board. That has been one suggestion and, certainly, is not the only one -- and what I'd

Page 63 like to ask for tonight from the RAB, if you will -- if you have some ideas on what we can apply for, we'd certainly like to hear them.

Then, in the last meeting -- the January meeting -- this last week -- the Kelly personnel demonstrated the Kelly Air Force Base Environmental Management Public web page -that's a handful, isn't it -- it's now under development and what they showed us was very nice. I like it. And, so -- I think this is a big step forward. This will give us much more access from the community -- those of us who have web capability -- and will help keep everybody informed a little bit better.

The web page will include -- among other things -- the TRS minutes and the agenda -so, if you want to know what the minutes are. you can run over there and get it and not have to wait for the mail -- the RAB minutes and the agendas -- and, also, the BCT minutes would be posted on there. The -- one more thing -change that page -- there we go -- and, also, maps and directions to Kelly and to the TRS meetings and RAB meetings. So, everybody knows where we're going.

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Also -- It was also mentioned --

George Rice mentioned -- could we put some of the documents on the web page? And I think that's very agreeable. I think that would be a good thing. Some of the documents are incredibly long. I don't know what we could do about that, but maybe we could do, at least, executive summaries on the web page, as a minimum.

The Site S-4 activities were updated. We're still waiting for more information, I believe, on that -- and the findings of the investigation and the cleanup alternatives activities will be addressed at the corrective measure study, which is due in June. So, it's a little premature on that.

We also discussed the membership of TRS -and this is something we probably need to talk a little about. We have had -- I think when we first set up the TRS -- it was set up by the RAB -- and we had a number of people who volunteered for the TRS. We want to keep it a fairly small committee. I think the number being chosen was eight. Does anybody remember -- as being a reasonable number?

Okay. We can probably look back on the minutes and find that. But somewhere around that -say less than ten -- and we have had a number of people on the committee and -- now, it's gotten to the point, I'm not sure who still wants to be. And, so, we need to kind of get that straightened out.

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We have also voted to include Mr. Quintanilla as a member. According to the RAB charter, though, that has to be approved by the RAB co-chairs -- and I suppose that General Murdock and I will discuss that -- but as far as I know, that will be okay.

Let's see. Oh, the letter from Mr. Banner -- we discussed that again -regarding -- regarding the efficiency of the TRS meetings -- and out of that discussion came a promise that myself and Mr. Banner and Major Devenoge would try to work out some sort of a mission statement to guide us in the TRS. Page 69 I see we've stayed exactly on schedule to this point. My goal is to remain on schedule. I have about ten minutes verbiage to -- to pass on to you and about ten minutes for questions and answers at the end of the presentation.

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We'll go ahead and cover these specific areas, give you a little bit of information on who we are and what our role in this effort is. This is our mission. Don't worry. I have a -- the next slide after this will be simpler and easier to understand. What's important with this particular slide is our interest in the -- in the Kelly situation is the environmental programs and the real personal property disposal -- that's the important part -- and the two laws that direct us to do this at the bottom.

Next slide. This is a little bit easier to understand and it's also the first place where I need to draw a distinction between my Air Force and General Murdock's Air Force. General Murdock's Air Force is the real go-to-war Air Force. He's got a mission -- a national security mission -- that he's got to perform every day. His mission is the

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maintenance of air frames and jet engines. Our mission has to support the disposal of property and we have to do these things to do our mission. So, we have a very, very different mission from -- from General Murdock. As long as General Murdock and General Bielowicz -the -- the Air Logistics Center is up and running, their mission is predominant over ours. We have to support their mission. But all of the time, we are also working on our mission. There's no doubt in my mind who's in charge at the Air Force Base. It's General Bielowicz and General Murdock. They are in charge until they pass over the responsibilities to us for our specific parts of the mission.

Again, we're talking about -- the property that -- that is my responsibility is the property that will go out of government ownership. It is not the property that gets transferred over to Lackland Air Force Base, which includes the airfield and most of the -the field right here.

Next slide. Our goal simply stated is rapid transfer of base property. For those of İ you who have paid attention to all of the other 2

base closures around the country, you would 3

probably know that rapid transfer is not what

usually happens. Usually, delays are

encountered and the next slide will show you 5 why. These are the laws that -- those two laws 6

that I pointed out in our first mission 7

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statement -- they're listed up at the top of 8

this. Those two laws tell us we have to follow

10 all those other laws. And, essentially -- and that's another major difference between the 11

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Air Logistics Center's mission and my mission. The Air Logistics Center mission has a whole 13

14 different unique set of laws with some overlap 15

with these laws -- and there's one or two

examples that I'd like to make.

Essentially, you have a handout -- you don't have to read this chart -- there's a handout -- and, I believe, we have handouts for people in the audience who want them -- but, essentially, the laws to the left all deal with property. The laws to the right of this line deal with environmental compliance -- or environmental laws that we have to comply with, regulations, executive orders, et cetera -- and

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1 you'll notice that CERCLA -- and we've got a handy thing here in the bottom for people who 2

3 have problems with acronyms -- but the

Comprehensive Environmental Response

Compensation Liability Act -- CERCLA -- is a

law that the ALC has always had to follow -and so has RCRA -- which is the Resource

Conservation & Recovery Act as amended.

The big difference in that is when our agency applies this law, there's a whole new section that's involved and it's 120(h) -- the section that deals with our responsibilities, our -- the federal government responsibilities associated with property disposal. Those are not -- The Air Logistics Center never had to -to comply with that aspect of CERCLA, but we do and we will before we're finished.

Next slide, please. More specifically. those laws tell us that these are our responsibilities. We, being the Air Force Conversion Agency. We need to maintain a liaison with the community. I've been down

22 23 here since Christmas Eve 1995 permanently:

moved my family down here from Washington, 24 25

D.C.; and I've been - spent more time with

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Mr. Roberson than I have with family liaising with the community.

You have to know that we've tried this several different ways. I've been in base closure -- a couple slides from now, I'll tell vou a little bit more about it -- but I've been involved with base closure since 1989. One of the great problems that we have is that each base that goes through it only goes through it once, which creates a huge training and education issue for us. I guarantee you, this would be easier if you went through it a second time, but I wouldn't want to wish that on any community. But -- and it's -- having been through it multiple times myself, I can tell you that it's never easier. It's always a challenge and we can always do a better job.

Yes, George?

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MR. RICE: I wonder how you define "community." Would community include the people who live in the neighborhoods around the base or are you talking about -- like, GKDC?

MR. MCCULLOUGH: "Community" means everyone. But if you look closely at our experience and if you look -- especially at

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MR. MCCULLOUGH: The reason you're here is because of this. Let me say that. MR. QUINTANILLA: I'm hoping you're bringing more.

MR. MCCULLOUGH: We manage leases. Over 50 percent of this property that -- of the facilities that will eventually be available are already under lease and occupied by tenants of the Greater Kelly Development Corporation. We work with the Greater Kelly Development Corporation in managing those -- those property interests.

We monitor environmental compliance after reuse. The common question that comes up in communities is, "What happens when the Air Logistic Centers or the mission leaves? When it's a fighter base, what happens when the fighter wing leaves?" Here, it's. "What happens when the Air Logistics Center leaves?" The answer is: It's still our responsibility. and our agency deals with that specifically.

We continue cleanup after reuse until we reach the levels that we've agreed to with the regulatory agencies. We execute the disposal

If you can please stand -- Frank, Chuck, Steve -- Tom, you can stand up, too -- and you will, in various endeavors, get to know the people on our staff. We're here. Every -- Every one of us has a sincere interest of assisting the community through this difficult period of time. We want to do the right things. Those who have dealt with us, I think, will tell you that we really are serious about that particular part of our mission.

The next slide. As far as property transfer, number one on our list is -- the regulators know and enforce with us -- is to continue to ensure protection of human health and the environment. Mr. Roberson can vouch for that. We restrict our real estate transactions pretty significantly to achieve these goals. The idea is to resolve those restrictions to the point where there is no longer an issue for human health and the environment, and, at that point, we can deed the property. We involve the community. We do it

through forums like this. We do it in a

- 2 variety of ways. We do it on a daily, if not
- 3 hourly, basis with the Greater Kelly
- 4 Development Corporation. We implement lease
- 5 and deed restrictions, which I just talked
- about, which are wholly to address the issues 6
- of health and -- and human safety. We create 7
- 8 environmental teams. The -- we -- that's a -
  - that's a collective "we" that does that. The

10 BRAC Cleanup Team is something that only exists

at BRAC locations and is something that our

agency is quite familiar with and participates

at all Air Force BRAC locations.

Next slide, please. As far as a general time line and specific major events that have occurred, this depicts it. It's a little bit difficult to read. It starts way over at the left with -- actually, 1995 -- and the -- the first red mark up there is the -- the date of approval, 28 September '95. That is the date that Congress failed to act to override the 1995 Base Closure Commission's recommendations

and, thereby, those recommendations became law

24 and created this situation for us.

I'm going to hand it off to Adam to talk

about some more specifics on the environmental program, but we have quite a ways to go and quite a bit of work to do.

MR. ANTWINE: Thank you,

Mr. McCullough.

As he mentioned, I'm Adam Antwine and I'm the Chief of Environmental Programs for AFBCA. I have also been here at Kelly -- actually, back at Kelly -- for about two and a half years now, working closely with the GKDC, as well as with the environmental staff, the legal staff at Kelly to try to implement some of the things that Mr. Pat McCullough has talked a little bit

about so far.

What I really want to get to here has to do with -- I think what the question was of the -- the RAB in terms of the action item -and that was this -- this bullet out here on the very end of this area talks about completing environmental cleanup and property disposal. Most of those activities that you see on this chart and -- many of those are included in excruciating detail in the packages that you have in the form of fact sheets. If

any of those fact sheets don't answer your

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questions, we've also included our cards. So, feel free to call us if you have questions on any of the processes that we deal with and are actively engaged in.

Referencing Mr. McCullough's statement on compliance with laws and regulations, completing environmental cleanup, as he mentioned under CERCLA, requires quite an extensive involvement with regulatory agencies over and above the extent of the active installations to the point that -- for the contaminants that we're dealing with in this forum in terms of groundwater contamination that may have migrated off of the installation, we have to comply with CERCLA 120(h), which states that final remedies must be in place and operating successfully prior to deed transfer.

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As Mr. McCullough has also mentioned, not a whole lot of that has occurred throughout our experience in BRAC. I'm a former Kelly-ite myself. I spent about 11 years working in the industrial complex and went off to Washington to develop some of the policies that now I'm back here implementing. It's great to be back home, but when you go places like D.C., you've KEHLYarABcithy 3334artiQularPage 1124 of 48 the regulatory agencies are involved, that we take the appropriate measures to ensure that health and the environment is protected. The other one that Pat has also mentioned is our responsibility for remedying all the contamination the Air Force has caused. That is for today and forevermore.

Implementation of BRAC policy: As I mentioned, we work closely with TNRCC, with EPA, as well as local regulatory entities. In BRAC, these policies derive much more investigation, much more scrutiny, because of the fact that we're going to be transferring property in terms of preparation for deed transfer. And I'd like to make note -- and in this forum you mainly hear about the cleanup activities that are going on as they're related to the soils, as they're related to groundwater contamination -- but there are a lot of things that are going on as a result of these BRAC policies that you may not hear a lot about, which we feel are, in a sense, preventative measures that -- that are taken to ensure that some of the same mistakes that we have made in

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got to be careful what you write because you may end up having to comply with some of those things. So -- anyway, it's good to be back home. But --

Next chart. What we're going to be concentrating on in our relationships with the Restoration Advisory Board -- we're going to be concentrating right now on educating you on what we're going to be doing over the next five to ten years to try to get property in a condition to where environmental health and safety is protected, as well as the Air Force's future liability, right along with the communities -- and that is GKDC's liability -and protection of human health for all the neighbors adjoining Kelly, as well as the folks that, actually, are going to be working out here as we redevelop the installation -- and I think these goals of cleaning up to support property disposal really involve -- force us to involve a lot of input from, number one, the reuse entity in terms of the GKDC. We workclosely with them every day on interests that are expressed, evaluating those interests to ensure that if, in fact, there is a lease for a

that is by implementing policies like removal 2 of underground storage tanks, removal of 3

underground fuel and hydrant systems, 4 industrial waste, tanks and piping. Those 5

things which have traditionally been 6

contributors to contamination of soil and 7

S groundwater are the very things that -- when we

come into a BRAC installation -- that we 9

concentrate a lot of time and effort in 10

11 investigation and/or removal of those systems.

That, you probably haven't heard a whole lot 12

about in your forum as a Restoration Advisory 13

Board, but you need to know there's another 14

side of that program that's brought in to a 15

BRAC installation that deals -- not only with 16

the cleanup -- but also deals with closing out 17

and minimizing the opportunity for 18 19

contamination to occur in the future. The way

we implement these is through restriction in 20

21 our leases to the GKDC. If these actions

aren't actually implemented by the Air Force, 22

23 many of them, we require the incoming tenants 24 to implement, such things as plugging of floor

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drains, which has been a pathway for

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contamination for many years and is a problem at just about every Air Force Base that we deal with in BRAC.

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BRAC funding: This is only for the portion of the base that, as Pat mentioned, becomes surplus, and that is everything east of the runway, the industrial area, that has since 1996 been funded by BRAC. We've had, I'd say, the luxury of adequate funding levels to not only address the cleanup issues, but to address these protective measures that I just discussed in terms of closure of the existing system, minimizing future risk for both the Air Force and for the community, to the tune of about 30 -- 20 to \$30 million per year is what we've been funded at since about fiscal year '96.

This goes into a little bit of the phases of reuse implementation and I'll just talk briefly about some of the major activities. As you see across the top, we've got, of course, planning, decision-making and decision implementation as the major processes. Mr. McCullough would also like to -- like you to make notice of a letter each of you should have in your package, which is an invitation to

I talked a little bit about the fact that we do additional work over and above what is normally done at an active installation, in terms of baseline surveys where we go out and do record search. We do what we -- what we're calling enhanced assessments to determine the integrity of some of these systems. Some of them may, in fact, be requested for reuse by the Redevelopment Authority. We're going through processes right now to ensure that if, in fact, allowed reuse of any of these systems, that we have done the appropriate assessments and integrity testing to ensure that any potential impacts are minimized in the future.

reuse of property when there are environmental concerns is through a process that's part of leasing called a finding of suitability to lease. This is an area where the regulatory agencies are heavily involved in our development of -- of leases to the GKDC and subsequent leases to their tenants where we identify what all these appropriate restrictions are that I've mentioned like drain plugging, notifications of existence of

The way we limit or place restrictions on

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attend some training that we're going to be offering next week on this process. It's a very complex process. We surely won't cover it here tonight, but you will have the opportunity to attend that training. There are focal points in there. If any of you would like to attend, you have an open invitation to attend the training which addresses these processes in much more detail.

Quickly, going down the left-hand side. the community reuse planning occurs with the GKDC's reuse plan or redevelopment plan, which has already been provided. As part of that, we develop -- or -- or plan for the disposal based on reuse proposals in terms of land uses. In GKDC's case, their plan, which includes aircraft maintenance -- and many, many various entities throughout the base are part of what go into the environmental impact analysis process, which is what you've heard of as the environmental impact statement, which was completed back in July of '97. And that is the basis, in fact, for all of the planning that we do in preparing these properties for redevelopment and reuse.

The last thing I'd like to talk about is the environmental cleanup and compliance with respect to closing installations. As I've mentioned, we have, I think, an opportunity here to make a positive impact on the environment and we, the Air Force Conversion Agency, look forward to working closely with -with the Restoration Advisory Board to ensure that your needs are met, that we share openly those things that are necessary to ensure that we protect human health and the environment in the future.

With that, I will turn it back over to Mr. McCullough for the conclusion.

MR. MCCULLOUGH: This appears -- the briefing appears to be a lot like our property

transfer goal. We've run over, but there's just a couple things.

The web site at the bottom of the page there -- if you -- you have it with you. You don't need to write it down. I think if you take a look at our web page, you'll -- you'll find it interesting if you're interested in the conversion of -- of Kelly.

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The training that Adam mentioned -- we do have two sessions. There, in fact, is one session next week, but I think the letters that you have invite you to a training session -an identical one -- in February -- and the reason they do is because there are already 80 people signed up to come to the one next week. The facilities -- It's at the Radisson Hotel downtown. The facilities can accommodate 100 people. So, if, in fact, you can go next week, it starts Monday afternoon -all day Tuesday and, then, Wednesday morning. You don't have to attend at all. There is no charge to you. I think that it would be very beneficial to you if you have questions on how we do this business.

Having said that, are there any

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questions? Yes, George?

MR. RICE: Yeah. I'd like to ask you about the BCT and -- you don't permit RAB members to attend those meetings on compliance. Would you be willing to make the materials that are distributed at those meetings available to the RAB?

MR. MCCULLOUGH: I'd like to clarify one thing. I don't tell -- I don't direct the BCT. The BCT is a coequal organization between TNRCC, EPA and the Air Force. I can only tell you -- I can influence a little bit what -- the Air Force position and that might be, but I cannot speak for who goes to the BCT and who doesn't. What I can do is try to help with that issue -- and I will -- I will help with that issue.

MR. RICE: I appreciate that. The other entities are the EPA, TNRCC and the Air Force?

MR. MCCULLOUGH: Right. And the reason for that, as -- as 1 think you should . know, is -- it goes back to the extreme difficulties we had since 1988 when we first started BRAC with who's in the lead on

the answer to that in that it makes the three agencies coequal in their approach to that -- to all the environmental issues. And we all -- I don't want to speak for TNRCC and EPA, but we all have our responsibilities statutorily and regulatorily that we must make sure gets accomplished in that and that's why it's such a tough job.

It's -- Communication is vital to this process -- absolutely vital. What you have to understand, if you're going to be in this process, is that not everybody is going to think the same way about things and you -there can't be a negative feeling about that. That's -- That's an understood. When you come sit at the table, you've got to expect that the person sitting across the table from you has a different agenda. If you try to reach across the table and get that person to be of the same mind, you're wasting your time. It's not going to happen. That's my experience in this. What you can do is take those issues and work them and sec if you can't come out with a successful answer and that's -- that's what we'll try to Page 92

do.

Yes, George? Armando's got his hand up.

MR. QUINTANILLA: Are you through,
George?

MR. RICE: I'll wait.

MR. QUINTANILLA: Okay. My question is: What is your role in the leaseback of the Red Horse property?

MR. MCCULLOUGH: Our role in the leaseback of any property is to lease the property to the Greater Kelly Development Corporation in furtherance of the conveyance that we have with them -- and, then, they make the determination on the specific training property.

There are kind of -- you're -- the -- you have not been helped a lot by what's been publicized on this, because there's some technical inaccuracies in it. That particular part -- Red Horse has two different areas we're talking about over there. One that they currently occupy of the compound, which is not surplus property. It was not included in the surplus determination that was made back in March of '96 and it was to be retained by the

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government. The parcel that you're talking about along the southern border, in fact, would be a sublease of the GKDC, not a leaseback. The original area would be a leaseback. The other area would be a sublease and, therefore, GRDC would be the landlord and that's why they're so prominent in that -- in that process.

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MR. QUINTANILLA: My reason for the question is: We live in that neighborhood and we're concerned about the grime and the dust and the dirt and the noise that may come from there and we weren't at all notified about this.

GEN. MURDOCK: If I could -- at this point -- I don't believe that the Red Horse issue is a topic that should be discussed at the Restoration Advisory Board -- and with that, I would turn to Paul Roberson and ask Paul if he has any question on it -- but it, in my view, does not pertain to the restoration of Kelly Air Force Base and I don't believe it's the appropriate topic to discuss now and would ask Paul for a comment, please.

MR. QUINTANILLA: If I --

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GEN. MURDOCK: Excuse me, please. I'd like to ask Paul for a comment -- and, then, we'll be glad to get back to you.

MR. ROBERSON: Mr. Chairman, I might just -- because it is such a topical issue, maybe I could just make a brief -- just a very brief comment.

GEN. MURDOCK: Surc.

MR. ROBERSON: And I think the first comment and the thing that's been inaccurate about the news reports is that there are -- no decisions have been made on whether -- on whether the GKDC will decide to pursue a lease with Red Horse.

When they proposed to us that they wanted to do some training on East Kelly, our response to them was that we're willing to consider any proposal that you'd like to present to us and give it a fair evaluation. As of last Friday, we did get their proposal and we're in the process of evaluating it right now. The conditions we laid down were that, one -that -- I mean, it had to make sense, you know, from a -- from a technical perspective -- and that's what we're trying to evaluate at the

moment. Secondly, if we thought it did make 1

sense from a technical perspective that -- the 2 3

first thing we would do is take it to the

4 people that live in that area and ask them for

comment. So, the -- the people that live in 5 that area will be provided an opportunity to 6

comment. And, then, the third thing was that 7 it would have to be reviewed and any final 8

decision made by the GKDC board.

Right now, we've got the plan. We're tentatively looking at a 10 February public meeting for the residents that live in that -just off of East Kelly to ask them for comments on it -- and, then, I -- what I would do is take to my -- if assuming we continue through this process -- to the GKDC board meeting at the end of February.

GEN MURDOCK: Armando, did you have a follow-up question?

MR. QUINTANILLA: I have no problem. As long as it's taken to the neighborhood and -- you know -- and let the -- the community decide as to what kind of industry we would like in that area. Do we want dusty industry or -- that sort of thing? We don't

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want to be bothered with all that dust and noise on -- on the weekends. We don't want it.

MR. MCCULLOUGH: I understand.

Yes, George?

MR. RICE: A question related to Red Horse -- excuse me -- directly on it. Will your organization have a role in the decision-making process as to whether or not the proposal is approved?

MR. MCCULLOUGH: Not at all, just as -- just as Mr. Roberson described. If -depending on what they request of us, we might withdraw that parcel from surplus and make it a leaseback. But the way it stands now, they would have to request that from us. So. barring any request on GK -- they're in the driver seat on it right now.

Those are good questions -- and -- and I've been somewhat frustrated the way this has been treated out in public -- because there's some inaccuracies there that have led community members to believe that a decision has been made and, in fact, to my knowledge, there has not.

What we're talking about is property that the Air Force did not declare surplus. In other words, property that they elected that they were going to retain. Is that correct?

MR. QUINTANILLA: I want a list of that.

MR. MCCULLOUGH: It depends on which piece of property we're talking about.

MR. OUINTANILLA: I want a list of those properties.

MR. MCCULLOUGH: We can --

MR. QUINTANILLA: Properties that they are retaining for Lackland. Those are the properties that I want.

MR. ROBERSON: Yeah. That's -- and there -- there was a formal Secretary of the Air Force surplus determination made and that's

MR. MCCULLOUGH: No. sir. Other than expansion of what I already said, which --I'll -- I'll be happy to expand with you individually if you'd like.

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GEN. MURDOCK: And, then, I guess, before I ask for questions and comments from the RAB members if the regulatory members of the BCT would have any comment -- either from the EPA or from the state -- concerning BCT membership.

MS. STANKOSKY: I have no comments

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other than what's in the package.

GEN. MURDOCK: Okay.

MR. QUINTANILLA: I have a comment

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GEN. MURDOCK: Surc.

MR. QUINTANILLA: I believe the BCT team is making some decisions that affect the people that have been impacted by the toxic spills from Kelly outside of Kelly.

There's numerous items in the minutes that I have read where it does involve us -- such as what is going to be done, how we're going to be informed on natural attenuation, if that's the way you're going to clean up our property and other different issues. And here, according to the executive order on environmental justice, it requires the people that are impacted by the toxic spills from any -- any agency -- to be part of the decision-making process -you know, the BCT has made this statement that, "Hey, they don't want to inconvenience the RAB members into a two-day meeting." I have never been polled. Do I want to be inconvenienced? 1 do -- 1 do not mind serving on that -in -- in the name of environmental justice.

let me finish, Armando? It is not me who is saying that. It's the BCT members. I want to make that absolutely clear. It's the regulators and the Air Force personnel.

l've also been assured -- and if you feel differently, we'll be glad to make an action item of it -- that any discussions that deal with Kelly's restoration program that are discussed in the BCT do, in fact, be -- are, in fact, reported to the TRS -- and, then, obviously, as Dr. Lene has done today, have the opportunity to communicate those issues to the RAB members in total. If I'm incorrect in that, we can certainly take that as an item to ensure that any of the BCT activities that affect the RAB be brought forth to the TRS for their review and, then, disseminated to the RAB.

I guess I'd turn to -- to Dr. Lene or Major Devenoge and ask if, in fact, that has been done in the past, to your knowledge.

DR. LENE: The BCT minutes have been distributed, but that's as far as I think we've gotten.

MAJ. DEVENOGE: Yes, sir. We're

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GEN. MURDOCK: Any other comments or questions?

George?

MR. RICE: Yeah. I'd like to say that I think that RAB members should be allowed to attend the meetings -- not -- not as participants, but as observers -- and that would further our role in getting information as to what's going on and letting other members of the public know about it.

However, since you won't permit RAB members to attend this meeting, I'd like to ask you the same question I asked Pat. Would you agree to distributing the materials that are handed out in BCT meetings to RAB members?

GEN. MURDOCK: Well, first of all, let me clarify. It's not -- I am not saying that you can't be a participant --

MR. RICE: You, the Air Force.

GEN. MURDOCK: -- in the BCT. The BCT members have stated they do not want a RAB member. It is not --

MR. QUINTANILLA: That is environmental racism, General.

GEN. MURDOCK: Excuse me. Would you

going to -- as I mentioned earlier, I think --

we're going to synchronize the BCT days from the TRS days, so they'll occur on the same day

so -- you know, the regulators will be here 9 February. We're going to have the BCT that

evening and we have the TRS meeting and -- so,

the conversation is still fresh in everybody's mind and we can discuss the items with BCT with

the TRS members that evening. MS. HUERTA: Sir, in other parts of

the country -- the BCT meetings -- are they open to the public? Who makes the decision in that?

GEN. MURDOCK: The BCT members make that decision.

MS. HUERTA: And those are by statute?

GEN. MURDOCK: Yes.

MS. HUERTA: Is it a local decision? GEN. MURDOCK: It's a decision of

that particular BCT membership.

MS. HUERTA: Is there anybody that has community members -- public members -that come in to listen?

GEN. MURDOCK: I'm not personally

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knowledgeable of the makeup of other BCTs. We can try and find -- We'll ask the question and -- and find out for you.

MS. HUERTA: Okay. Thanks.

MR. ROBERSON: If I can make a comment, Mr. Chairman, I --

GEN. MURDOCK: Sure.

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THE WITNESS: It seems to me that -that the key question, we, the community representatives, have got to ask ourselves is -- it's not -- it seems to me the issue of -- you know, can you go to BCT meetings or any other kind of meetings is really not the issue. The issue is: Do we the community get a chance to review and comment and influence any decisions before they're finally implemented? And if I understand this process, at least, where we've been so far, that there's no -- that no -- no remediation action is going to be implemented without a public comment period and without an opportunity or all of us to get deeply into it.

Now, if we should, along the process, view that we're not getting an adequate opportunity to do that or if -- or if, in fact, we should

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MR. QUINTANILLA: I'm just going to make one more comment on this. This RAB -every document that comes to this RAB or this TRS first is reviewed and clarified by the BCT before it comes in there. Any -- Any document that they don't want us to see is withheld. We want to -- We want to be part of that decision-making process.

MR. ROBERSON: Well, Armando, I guess my response would be: If there are documents that should be -- public documents are being withheld, then that's a problem that we, collectively, need to address and do something about.

MR. QUINTANILLA: It's right in the BCT minutes. It's not working, General.

GEN. MURDOCK: Well, I need you to --

MR. QUINTANILLA: It's not environmentally just.

GEN, MURDOCK: I need you to articulate to the RAB and to myself what documents are being withheld.

MR. QUINTANILLA: I have asked for that under the Freedom of Information Act, sir,

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learn that decisions are being made in a secret meeting that the community's -- and, then,

being implemented without the community having

an opportunity to comment, that's a totally

different situation -- and, then, I would join 5

forces with Armando and everybody else and

demand that we have an opportunity to sit in that. But it seems to me you've got to focus

on what the issue is. The issue is: Do we

9 have a chance to review and comment and 10

influence decisions? And sitting at a BCT meeting is not the issue, in my mind.

Now -- but as I understand it, Dr. Lenc,

you are now getting copies of the minutes from the BCT. So, the TRS is getting a chance to review that level of what the issues are that they're talking about. You know, every organization probably has to have the

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opportunity to have some internal meetings to 19

discuss issues and I guess my view is this is 20

kind of a federal government internal meeting, 21

and as long as we, the community, have a chance 22 to comment on any actions before decisions are 23

made, I feel comfortable with that. But I'd 24

like other RAB members to comment, too, and sec

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and you will -- possibly come through your office.

GEN. MURDOCK: Well, what -- can you tell me what documents are withheld?

MR. QUINTANILLA: I don't know that.

They won't tell me --

GEN. MURDOCK: So, you're speculating that they're being withheld?

MR. OUINTANILLA: No, sir. It states in there.

MAJ. DEVENOGE: If I can just interject here for a second, sir, we -- we talked about this a great deal last Tuesday night -- for those of us that are on the TRS -- you may recall the conversation -and -- and I made it clear then and I want to reiterate it here -- that the TRS and the RAB receive the documents at the same time the regulators do. Those are usually in the form of a draft final document. That means the document hasn't gone final. It's going to get -- get ready to go final. For the moment, it's still -- it's a draft -- a draft final report -- and the TRS has the opportunity to review it and comment on it just like everybody

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else. So, I think -- I think we covered that one adequately last week, Mr. Quintanilla, and I'm not sure what clsc we need to do to change what it is we're doing.

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MR. BANNER: I want to answer that, Tom, that the BCT does not actually review preliminary drafts of documents before they get issued to the state EPA or the -- the RAB itself. We don't have time in BCT minutes to go pulling through documents and pulling out the stuff we don't like.

The other thing I would add is that there seems to be a major concern that the RAB is not getting information, either through documents or other processes -- Mr. Rice mentioned that -- and, yet, Mr. Quintanilla, you also mentioned that the TRS has had access to documents, but hasn't reviewed them. So, in my mind, I wonder, "Well, what" -- "what are we actually doing here?" We're getting these documents. We're not looking at them. And, then, we're saying, "We need more documents." Well, what are we going to do with more documents? We haven't already looked at what's available?
