In a four-hour period, contributors provided 77 coats and 11 pairs of boots, as well as some hats and gloves. Further, monetary donations of cash and gift cards totaled more than \$1,700. June Pursey said the coat drive at Walmart was a real boost for the group, which gives out an average of 1,300 coats per year in the county. Noble also commended the community generosity he witnessed during the event and, even as the winter gear was being loaded up for transport to the Coats for Kids building, people were still approaching the volunteers to make a gift. Noble said it was the MSP's first time doing an event such as this in the area, and there are already plans to bring it back next year. DHD2 said it has used its first allotment of vaccine and as we receive more shipments, DHD2 plans to finish as many of the 1A group as possible.

Last week, the Michigan Department of Health and Human Services (MDHHS) updated their vaccine priority guidance and has authorized local health departments to begin vaccinating the following groups starting Monday, Jan 11:

• People age 65 years or older.

• Frontline, essential workers with frequent or ongoing exposure as a part of their work. This includes some, but not all essential workers previously designated in 1B. First responders, police officers, jail and prison staff, pre-K-12 teachers and childcare providers are included
