- Air Force Administrative Record: AF official record storage for decision-related documents. The AR serves as the official legal record that contains the documents that form the basis for a selection of a CERCLA response action. The AF should post RAB material that is used in Air Force decision-making in the AR for the former Wurtsmith AFB.

 - PA/SI reports, proposed plans, RODs
 - Public notices

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Former Wurtsmith AFB Training: CERCLA



Comprehensive Environmental Response, Compensation and Liability Act

The Air Force's investigation work and mitigation actions are guided by CERCLA, applicable state laws and the EPA's drinking water health advisory of 70 parts per trillion.

AFCEC is moving forward aggressively in accordance with the CERCLA process to identify, define and mitigate potential contamination.



The CERCLA process:

- Ensures thorough investigation work
- Leads to proper and complete removal actions
- Promotes accountability, community involvement and long-term protectiveness



Former Wurtsmith AFB Training: CERCLA



ASSESSMENT

Preliminary Assessment/ Site Inspection

Reviews historical information and site visits with limited sampling to evaluate the presence or absence of contamination. **INVESTIGATION**

Remedial Investigation /Feasibility Study

Evaluates the nature and extent of contamination at a site and assesses potential threats to human health and the environment.

AGREEMENT

Proposed Plan /Record of Decision

Agency coordinates with regulator, recommends preferred remedy, presents proposed cleanup plan to public, issues ROD stating cleanup alternatives. DESIGN AND CONSTRUCTION Remedial Design/Action

Develops detailed cleanup plans necessary to implement the remedy selected in the ROD. **OPERATION** Remedial Action-Operation

Remedial action follows design and includes the construction or implementation phase of site cleanup.

MANAGEMENT

Long-Term Management, Oversight

Ensure site cleanup work continues and the cleanup continues to be effective.

STANDARDS AND REGULATIONS

Congress authorizes regulatory agencies, like the Environmental Protection Agency, to enforce environmental laws to protect public health and the environment. These laws, along with laws promulgated by the individual states, establish acceptable limits for contaminants in relevant exposure pathways and give responsible parties the parameters necessary to investigate, respond to and resolve contamination. Without established standards, federal and state agencies are often unable to use taxpayer dollars to investigate or respond to undefined contamination and regulatory agencies are unable to enforce action.





RAB Business: Community Co-chair



Community Co-chair

Responsibilities:

- Coordinate with the Air Force Co-chair and other RAB members to prepare agenda prior to each RAB meeting
- Ensure community member participation is open and constructive
- Attend meetings and ensure community issues and concerns related to restoration are raised
- Assist with providing information to the public
- Report back to the community
- Serve without compensation





THE OTTLE MOMENTS

Community Co-chair

- Co-chair should have sufficient authority and ability to fully undertake RAB chairperson responsibilities
- Length of the Co-chair term should be decided by the RAB and outlined in the RAB's operating procedures (one- or two-year terms are common)
- Co-chair termination procedures should be included in the RAB's operating procedures
- Co-chair is selected by the primary community RAB members (majority vote)
- Community Co-chair Volunteers
- Process to Elect Community Co-chair
